BANKERS JOIN WAR ON LOAN AGENTS

Hold Names Are Imitated to Deceive Public.

ASK ADDITIONAL LEGISLATION

Present Bill to Prevent Infringement of Copyright and Usury Not Sufficient to Curb Evils of Concerns Doing Business in Capital Under False Colors, Says Letter.

That a number of Washington concerns are doing business under names similar to those of bigger firms on whose reputation they thrive was the subject of a complaint to Commissioner Rudolph made yesterday by George E. Fleming, of the Union Trust Company.

The part of the letter referring to this subject read as follows: "For some time past the practice of certain persons, firms, and corporations transacting the business in the District of Columbia, in the household goods, other chattels, salaries, &c., adopting and using corporate titles closely resembling those of the regularly incorporated banks and trust companies, has caused great annoyance and trouble to our financial institutions, and loss and confusion to the public.

"A bill to regulate the business of the so-called 'loan companies' was introduced

into Congress some time ago. This was done in the form of an amendment to the then pending Commissioners' bill for the same purpose. Failing in this, a bill was prepared under the direction of the former Board of Commissioners and introduced into both Houses of Congress.

Not Sufficient Protection.

"But this bill hardly answers the purpose that we have in mind. It simply protects any corporation in the use of its corporate name as a sort of copyright to the first user or discoverer of a particular corporate designation.

"Our purpose is to set apart for financial institutions here that are regularly incorporated, capitalized, taxed, and visited, the words 'loan,' 'bank,' 'bankers,' 'savings bank,' 'trust,' and 'trust companies,' and to prevent their misleading use by persons, firms, and corporations that only pretend to be banks, loan, and trust companies, and thus deceive the public as to their true business occupation. You perhaps know that the City Directory contains more than thirty names of the so-called 'loan shark companies.'

"An examination of the banking statutes of the several States and Territories, issued by the National Monetary Commission, reveals the fact that most of our States and Territories have laws and penalties in their statute books to prevent and punish unauthorized banking."

New Bill Is Urged.

The letter concludes with a request to the Commissioners to have a new bill drawn up that will remedy these evils and put a stop to this practice—something that shall be unlawful for any bank, trust, loan, mortgage, savings, safe deposit, or other corporation or company of any kind, whether organized under the laws of the United States, the Dis-

trict of Columbia, any of the Territories, or any State or foreign country, to do or transact any business in the District of Columbia under a name which is the same or so similar that it is likely to be mistaken for any such corporation or company first engaged in such business, and any violation of this prohibition committed after July 1, 1910, shall be subject to a penalty of \$50 for each day during which it is committed or repeated.

NEW NORMAL SCHOOL.

Will Be Located in Columbia Heights.

A much-pleased man in Washington was J. Clinton Hiatt, a member of the committee on education and school facilities of the Columbia Heights Citizens' Association, when the District appropriation act, signed by President Taft, for it included the item for the new normal school building, at a cost of \$27,000, to be located at Eleventh and Harvard streets, Columbia Heights.

Mr. Hiatt has worked zealously for this new normal school from the beginning of the present session of Congress until the bill was on its way to the White House. It was he who obtained the passage of resolutions of twenty-one citizens' associations favoring a normal school. These resolutions were filed with the Senate District Committee and also with the Appropriations Committee of the House, asking favorable action at the present session.

The District of Columbia has never in its history had a building for normal school for the training and instruction for future teachers, and Mr. Hiatt is justly entitled to a great deal of credit in helping along this worthy building.

This new building will contain about forty rooms, and up-to-date and modern improvements. Plans for the structure are to be made soon.

A few months ago the committee on education and school facilities of the Columbia Heights Citizens' Association took action determining to procure a normal school building, as lots had already been purchased for that purpose several years ago. Already it has been suggested that there should be a corner-stone laying with appropriate exercises.

The committee on education and school facilities consist of William B. Todd, chairman; Percival M. Brown, A. Left-

wich Sinclair, J. Clinton Hiatt, Randolph D. Hopkins, William R. Hillyer, Frederick C. Croxson, and Judge Charles S. Bundy, president, ex-officio member.

POLICE TO HOLD AUCTION.

Lost, Stolen, and Abandoned Property Will Go Under Hammer.

It was announced yesterday that all the lost, stolen, and abandoned property which is in the hands of the Washington police will be sold at auction at 10 o'clock next Saturday morning by S. Bensinger, Sixth street, between Louisiana avenue and C street. This annual sale always attracts a large crowd.

No razors, revolvers, or other weapons which have come into the hands of the police through devious channels are to be sold. A notice to this effect was issued by the Commissioners to the property clerk yesterday.

Saturday a Fatal Day.

London, May 28.—Authorities on things supernatural may be able to explain why Saturday has been a fatal day to the rulers of England. William III died on Saturday, March 8, 1702; Queen Anne on Saturday, August 1, 1714; George II on Saturday, October 25, 1760; and George IV on Saturday, June 26, 1830. George I just missed Saturday by two hours, dying at 2 a. m. on Sunday, and the late King Edward breathed his last just a quarter of an hour before midnight, Friday night, May 6.

FOUR WASHINGTON SLEUTHS REWARDED

Texas Sheriff Sends \$100 for Bubber Robinson Catch.

A check for \$100 was received by the police department yesterday from Sheriff A. L. Ledbetter, of Dallas County, Tex., as the balance of a reward for the arrest of "Bubber" Robinson by Detective Sergeants Baur and Cornwell on information furnished by George Brown, Maj. Sylvester forwarded the check and the letter to Commissioner Johnston with the recommendation that this amount be equally divided among the three men, after 20 per cent is deducted for the police pension fund.

Another reward was \$5 sent in by M. M. Coleman as a present for Private R. H. Beckley, of the Second precinct, for the officer's prompt detection and arrest of William Turner, who stabbed Mr. Coleman about three months ago. Turner was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.
