BOY DROWNS SELF TO WIPE OUT DEBT

Note Explains Fate of Robert Lynch, of Baltimore.

Baltimore, June 17.—Because he owed \$25 to his fellow employees of the Fidelity Insured Deposit Company of Baltimore, a fifteen-year-old Robert Lynch drowned himself in the high service reservoir at Druid Hill Park this morning. He left a note by the water side telling why he ended his life, and bidding his mother farewell in pathetic words.

A park policeman found the boy's coat by the side of the lake with a slip pinned to it saying: "I am drowning in the lake. (Signed) Robert Lynch." The policeman took the coat and started for the lake. After he had advanced a few paces a letter fell from the inside pocket.

A drugging party recovered the body, which was taken to the home of the boy's parents. Young Lynch was in good standing with the bank and owed nothing outside of the money he had borrowed from his fellow employees. The following is the letter found in the boy's coat:

To my dear mother: I suppose you will be very much grieved when you read what I have done, but don't worry, mother; I will send you on the other side. The reason I did this is because I owed nearly \$25 to the bank. I have no friends and please have Father send me some of his money. Dear mother, you have always been very kind to me, and I hope that you will be well and happy. I will be with you in heaven.

Trist in the Lord and do not grieve over me. Good-bye, mother, tell them all good-bye for me, and my little sister, I am sorry I did not treat you better in my life. Good-bye, mother. Your dear son, ROBERT L.
