Once again our wretched young athletes faced a flinging artist who knew how to pitch the pill past their bats. He is Mr. J. Warhop, of New York, and his act yesterday was to humble the Nationals 7 to 4 in the first game at home in a month.

Back from a successful invasion of the Western cities, but disastrous sojourns in New York and Boston, the Nationals drew almost a capacity grand stand and bleacher crowd. Six thousand persons, including "Frenchy," turned out, and they roared long and loud for McAleer's braves, hoping against hope that the hoodoo would be buried and luck break out.

Wayne Luck refused to switch, and by winning the New Yorkers made it the sixth defeat in a row, or the worst record the Nationals have established this season, and one, it is hoped, will not occur again soon.

Walter Johnson pitched his third game of the week, and to the casual observer had just as much stuff on his fast ball as ever. Yet the Highlanders got to him good and proper, flaying his offerings for ten hits, including a three-bagger.

Walter lasted seven innings, and then Manager McAleer propelled Bill Hinrichs into the box and worked out before the game. Frank Oberlin says that the youngster has good curves and fair speed.

In the sixth inning, with Chase on third, the signal for a "squeeze play" was given. Knight laid down a perfect bunt and caught the entire Washington infield napping.

Chase sandwiched in a lucky two-bagger in the ninth. The ball took a bad bound before reaching Elberfeld, and Hal got to second before it could be returned.

It is likely that Groom and Walker will twirl against the Yankees to-morrow.

Milan did not get a hit, but the speedy little outfielder will more than make up for this before the series closes.

Gessler had an off day in right field, miffing two fly balls. The sun bothered him a whole lot, as he has been away from the Capital for a month.

Chase's hot liner in the seventh was stopped by Conroy, who jumped over so many feet in the air and grasped the seemingly elusive spheroid with one hand. Not being satisfied with this spectacular play, Conroy had the nerve to slam the ball to first and came mighty high doubling Walter.

It was nice of Manager McAleer to introduce a comedy effect by putting Bill Hinrichs in the game after the fans felt furious.

The most effective ball pitched by Warhop is an underhand raise ball, or a brand that would make a cricket bowler envious.

Bill Hinrichs was sent into the box when the eighth opened, his first trial in the big league. A single by Elberfeld, based on balls, and safe crack by Elberfeld tacked on another run. Hinrichs, although touched up for three hits, had but one run scored against him in the ninth, as George McBride came across with a double play in a tight place.
