FLEET'S CRUISE IS OUTLINED

Sixteen Battle Ships to Visit European Ports Next Fall.

Detailed Itinerary Announced by Navy Department—Trip Mapped Out for Torpedo Division.

Sixteen battle ships will mobilize in the Atlantic Ocean next November and make the cruise to European ports. The fleet's detailed itinerary was made public yesterday at the Navy Department, and has been approved by Acting Secretary of the Navy Beakman Whitrop and Rear Admiral Stanton Schroeder, U. S. N., commanding officer of the fleet.

The present policy of the Navy Department is to divide the fleet into divisions in order to afford division commanders as much experience in handling their vessels as possible. After visiting various ports the battle ships will mobilize at Gibraltar on December 20. Christmas Day will be spent there. On December 31 the fleet will leave for Guantanamo, where it will arrive about January 16.

The cruise of the torpedo division will be independent of the battle ship cruise. The destroyers will leave New York on November 1 and will visit Ponta Delgada, Loughorn, Algiers, and Madeira, returning to San Juan on January 12.

The battle ship will visit Mediterranean ports according to the following schedule: Connecticut and Michigan, to Villefranche and Naples; Delaware and North Dakota, to Toulon and Genoa; Louisiana and South Carolina, to Phalerum Bay and Alexandria; Kansas and New Hampshire, to Alexandria and Phalerum Bay; Georgia and Nebraska, to Barcelona and Lisbon; Rhode Island and Virginia, to Marsailles and Lisbon; Minnesota and Vermont, to Naples and Villefranche, and Mississippi and Idaho, to Genoa and Toulon.

The tender Yankton will go to Ponta Delgada, Villefranche, Naples, and Madeira, the hospital ship Solace to Algiers, Lisbon, Gibraltar, and the supply ship Culgoa to Lisbon and Gibraltar.

ICEMEN UNDER WATCH. Sealer of Weights Begins Campaign Against Cheating.
