It took Uncle Cy eleven innings to turn the trick, and in the opinion of some 7,000 fans he was mighty lucky to get away with it, as the Nationals had the Ohio crowd 1 to 0 until the ninth, when Reising gave a costly base on balls and Collegian Henry apparently suffered from a case of rattles, as he injected a bum ball into the chapter and lost his head on a bunt, allowing two sacrifice flies to put the visitors in the lead. At that, the home team came near winning out in the final half of this inning, and had Kid Elberfeld allowed Lelivelt to try for the plate on Conroy's smash to right two victories might have been registered.

Gray Delivers the Goods.

Dolly Gray was master of the situation at every stage in the first contest. Cleveland could not touch him. In fact, not a single Nap stirred the dirt around third base until the ninth inning. Gray allowed four scattered hits, while McAlister's braves knocked Harkness out of the box and made life miserable for Cy Falkenberg.

Milan's hitting was a noteworthy feature from a Washington standpoint, the little fellow smashing on four safe drives in the first game and one in the second.

Gabby Street was hurt during the fifth inning of the second game, when Stovall was blocked off at the plate. Street's right wrist was slightly sprained, and he may have to lay off for a couple of days.

Nationals Get to Harkness.

In the opening bill Harkness looked good for two innings. In the third he weakened, gave two bases on balls, and was scouted for a couple of two-baggers, scoring one run. Three well-placed hits added another in the fourth, while bases on balls to Beckendorf and Gray and Milan's single scored another tally in the sixth. Falkenberg took up the reins when two were out in the sixth, but was as wild as a March hare in the seventh, three runs coming the way of the Nationals, while the eighth produced one more, boosting the home total to seven.

Lajoie, Graney, and Birmingham played great ball for the visitors, while Kilifer showed up the best for the home folks.
