These consisted of baby swings, a merry-go-round, teeter ladders, parallel bars, a jumping horse, lawn swings, and seesaws.

In the baseball game for girls Georgetown won from Rosedale by a score of 15 to 12, the contest being called at the end of the third inning owing to darkness. In the basket-ball game, the teams were chosen from among the Rosedale girls. The team headed by Marie Baron won.

Many beautiful and intricate folk dances were given on the green by the girls. They consisted of Spanish, Norwegian, Brownie, and Rhineland dances, and were enthusiastically applauded.

Field day exercises of the Juvenile Court playground were held under the direction of Miss Elizabeth E. Garnett. The ideal weather brought out a large attendance at the grounds, which are situated at Nineteenth and E streets northwest. The feature was an exhibition of industrial work by the girls.

**Melon Feast Enjoyed.**  
 Owing to the lateness in getting started, none of the girls' contests was held. Instead a watermelon feast was much enjoyed.

In the boys' events a baseball game was played. The Western Buds defeated the Juvenile Court team by the score of 9 to 6.

To inspect the new apparatus installed and look over plans for the new Howard playground which the association intends to complete in the near future, as well as to witness the events of the afternoon, an unusually large crowd assembled at the grounds, Fifth and W streets northwest.

Much surprise was shown by the visitors at the industrial exhibition of work done by the children during the summer. Under the direction of T. E. Johnson, Miss Minnie Price, and W. S. Duffield, folk dances were given by the girls, and games were played by the boys.
