TO-DAY IN HISTORY.

The Revolution of 1399—September 30.

The 30th of September, 1399, marks the beginning of an epoch of very great moment in English history. It is the date of the transference of the English crown from the House of Plantagenet to that of the House of Lancaster. On the previous day a deputation from the Lords and Commons had waited on King Richard II then a prisoner in the Tower, and had obtained from him a formal renunciation of the throne in favor of his cousin, Henry of Bolingbroke, who a few weeks before had landed from Exile at Ravenspur, in Yorkshire, and in an astonishingly short time had made himself master of the kingdom.

At the time of Henry's landing Richard was absent on an expedition to Ireland, and for some time remained in ignorance of what was transpiring at home. On receiving intelligence of Henry's alarming progress, he despatched at once the Earl of Salisbury with an army, but this nobleman, after disembarking at Conway, soon found himself deserted by all his forces, and Richard, on landing a few days afterward at Milford Haven, was soon placed in a similar predicament.

Deserted on all hands, the unfortunate monarch was compelled to surrender himself to the Earl of Northumberland, and meet, at the castle of Flint, his cousin Henry. He was then conducted as a prisoner to Chester, from which he was afterward transferred to the Tower; and then, on the 29th of September, he received the deputation from Parliament already mentioned. The following day his renunciation of the crown was formally ratified, and himself formally deposed.

While this procedure was going on, Henry of Bolingbroke, Duke of Hereford, remained seated in his usual place covered with cloth of gold. As soon as eight commissioners had proclaimed the sentence of deposition he arose, approached the throne, and having solemnly crossed himself, said: "In the name

of God the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, I, Henry of Lancaster, challenge this realm of England, because I am descended by right line of blood from the good lord King Henry III, and through that right, that God of his grace hath sent me with the help of my kin and of my friends, to recover it, and which realm was in point to be undone for default of government and undoing of the good laws."

He then knelt for a few minutes in apparent devotion on the steps of the throne on which he subsequently took his seat, being conducted thither by the Archbishop of Canterbury and York. Through a manifest usurpation, the seizure of the throne by Henry IV seems to have been fully in accord with the will of the English nation, which was disgusted with the corrupt and imbecile administration of Richard II.

The vigorous government of Henry and his son, the chivalrous Henry V, may almost appear a vindication of their wisdom in this change of dynasty. But the terrible wars of the Roses, and the miserable end of Bolingbroke's unhappy grandson, Henry VI, amply avenged the wrongs of the Plantagenet family. However we may reverence the ability of Henry IV, and excuse the usurpation of the crown, a dark cloud must ever rest on his memory in connection with the unfortunate Richard II, who was mysteriously murdered by Henry's orders in Pontefract Castle, a short time after his deposition.

On September 30 the first American vessel to make a trip around the world started from Boston (187), and the convention of France was concluded (180). To-day is the birthday of Euripides, the tragic dramatist (480 B. C.); Pompey, the Great (106 B. C.); William Hutton, miscellaneous writer (1720); Sergeant S. Prentiss, lawyer and author (1808); Samuel S. ("Sunset") Cox, the American statesman (1822); Elias H. Roberts, journalist and financier (1827); Matthew Stanley Quay (1833); and John W. Danenhower, the arctic explorer (1849). To-day is the date of the death of Emperor Rudolph I (1291); Isabella of Bavaria, Queen of Charles VI, of France (1435); and George Whitefield, the celebrated English divine (1790).

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PAPAL EMISSARY

DINES AT LEGATION

Cardinal Vannutelli Greets Notables of Church.

RECEIVED AT WHITE HOUSE

Meeting of His Eminence with President Taft Followed by Sight-seeing Tour of Capital—Library of Congress Holding Most Attention of Party—Hailed on Arrival Here.

After a busy day in which he met the President and visited the Capitol, Library of Congress, and other places of interest in Washington, His Eminence Cardinal Vincenzo Vannutelli, personal emissary of Pope Pius X, was dined last night at the papal legation by the papal delegate, Mr. Falconio.

Cardinal Vannutelli's meeting with the President took place immediately after luncheon at the legation. Cardinal Vannutelli, his suite, and many prominent clergymen met President Taft at 2 o'clock and after an exchange of greetings started on a sightseeing tour of the city.

The party spent about an hour in the Capitol, and then visited the Library of Congress. The library seemed to hold the attention of the party more than anything else that they saw. Herbert Putnam, Librarian of Congress, personally took the party in charge and showed them the merits of the building.

The dinner at the legation last night was served in the spacious dining-room, and included, besides the cardinal's suite, clergymen and notables of the Roman Catholic Church. The room was decorated with the papal colors, and flowers were abundantly displayed.

Church Notables Present.

The dinner party included, besides the cardinal and the host, Mr. Falconio, Archbishop Ireland, Archbishop Blenk, of New Orleans; Bishop Dennis O'Connell, auxiliary bishop of San Francisco; Bishop Ortynsky, the Greek Bishop for the United States; Prince De Crov, Rev. Father Himmel, S. J., of Georgetown University; Mr. Shahan, of the Catholic University; Mr. Tamper, an official in the office of Cardinal Merry Del Val; Mr. Lega; Mr. Mackin, Thomas Kelly, a New York banker; Signor M. G. Vannutelli, nephew of the cardinal; Signor Gelase, secretary to Cardinal Vannutelli; M. Domenico Caristi, gentleman in waiting to Cardinal Vannutelli, and several out-of-town prelates.

To-day his eminence will visit Holy Cross Academy, where he will hold a reception for the pupils. In the afternoon he will visit Catholic University and take luncheon as the guest of Dr. Shahan. The afternoon will be devoted to a visit to the Georgetown University. This evening he will be a guest at a dinner in the rectory of St. Patrick's Church, Rev. William T. Russell will be the host.

After the dinner he will visit St. Patrick's rectory the cardinal will hold a reception in the church and bestow the papal benediction.

Hailed by Thousands.

The cardinal arrived in Washington yesterday at noon, his train being an hour and a half late. The welcome he received from 10,000 men, women, and children was the greatest ever accorded a visiting clergyman.

As he passed through the gates and entered the concourse the children, led by a band, sang "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name," while the apostolic delegate, Mr. Falconio, passed down the line formed by the children through the president's room and into his waiting automobile, which conveyed him to the papal legation, 1511 Biltmore street.

The train which brought the cardinal from Buffalo was due to arrive at 10:30 o'clock, and nearly every Catholic clergyman in Washington was at the station to greet him. Archbishop Ireland and several out-of-town prelates were also in the President's room to receive him.

Despite the fact that the train was late, the children and spectators were kept in good humor through the medium of the band, which discoursed music ranging from hymns to rag-time. Beginning at 10:30, every incoming train was greeted with cheers. The adult spectators were packed on the west side and the children on the east. Another large party waited outside, and the cardinal's automobile had difficulty in getting away.

Allowed on the Platform.

The members of the clergy who were to greet the distinguished prelate, the newspaper men, and the photographers were permitted on the platform fifteen minutes before the train pulled into the station. The special car, containing the cardinal and his party, was the first of the string. His eminence did not alight until all the other passengers had left the immediate vicinity. When the passengers had passed to the other end of the platform the cardinal, in his rich scarlet robes, was assisted to the platform, and, removing his broad-brimmed low-crown cardinal's hat, bowed and smiled a greeting to the group of priests. He posed for the photographers and then started up the
