TO-DAY IN HISTORY.

The Celebrated Junius Letters—November 3. "Junius" was born on November 3, 1768, but who he was, what he was, and how he came to be, has never been ascertained, more than on that date his name appeared attached to a political letter in Woodfall's Public Advertiser, in London, which attracted a great deal of attention, and was followed by a considerable series of letters that, by their force of invective, their keenness of sarcasm, and the clear, brilliant style in which they were written, produced a wonderful impression, and they have since taken a place among the standard works in the English language. Every effort that could be devised by the British government, or prompted by private indignation, was made to discover the writer of these letters, but the authorship remains an unsettled question to this day. They have been most generally ascribed to Sir Philip Francis, but a long list of other prominent Englishmen have been accused of being their author. "I am the depository of my own secret, and it shall perish with me," said Junius. The Junius Letters attacked the British government; they flayed public abuses and demanded greater liberty for the British people at large. The writer assailed the foremost men of the day, even King George III himself. The letters were couched in polished, flawless English. They were brilliant, fearless, mercilessly direct. Their language was ferocious in its intense bitterness. The signature was simply "Junius." These letters appeared in the Advertiser from 1769 to 1772. The editor of the paper denied all knowledge of the mysterious author, declaring that the letters came from an unknown source, and that all efforts to get into personal communication with the writer had failed. From the state secrets Junius so often exposed, it was evident he must be a man of very high rank and intimately associated with the government and the King. But, of all the statements thus placed on record, the one that has been fixed, no less than thirty-seven people—one or two women among the number—were accused of writing the Junius Letters. The Marquis of Lansdowne once said he had proof as to Junius' identity and that he would soon publish the facts. But he died shortly afterward, with his promise unfulfilled. Pitt, prime minister of England, who Junius defamed in his letters, was "wonderful to know who the man of mystery was. But, beyond denying that it was Francis, he would not divulge the secret. Dr. Samuel Johnson told Boswell, his own biographer: "I know no man but Edmund Burke who is capable of writing these letters. And Burke denies it." It seems marvelous that any man for four years could have moved safely and fearlessly among the great men of the day, and yet have eluded all suspicion. The whole affair must always be a mystery. Junius' reasons for remaining unknown are much easier to guess. Not only could he strike more deadly blows from secure exposure or punishment, but the very fact that he was a "mystery" lent to his letters a strange influence that no identified man could hope for. As time went on there was not a public man who did not tremble lest he himself should be next to fall under the vitriolic sarcasm of the unknown. In Parliament the matter came up for frequent discussions. The great Edmund Burke once made an address in the House on the subject in the House of Commons, beginning: "How comes this Junius to have broken through the cobwebs of the law and to range uncontrolled, unpunished, through the land? The myriads of the court are pursuing him in vain. The mighty bear of the forest has broken through all their snares. When I read his attack upon the King my blood ran cold!" In January, 1772, the series of terrible, anonymous letters ceased as suddenly as it had begun. Did Junius die, then, or did he feel that discovery was too close at hand? On November 3 the Plymouth Company was organized in 1620; the Declaration of Rights was adopted by Maryland in 1776, and a provisional government was organized in Texas in 1835. To-day is the birthday of Lucan, the Latin poet (c. 95 B. C.); Stephen F. Austin, the Texas patriot, in whose honor its capital is named (1793); William Cullen Bryant, poet (1794); Confederate Gen. Jubal A. Early (1816), and Justice Edward D. White (1856). To-day is the date of the death of Constantine, Roman Emperor (337); Pope Leo the Great (461), and Bishop Robert Lowth, the biblical writer (1737).

Big "Mum" Show Opens at Plant Bureau. Washington's big "mum" show—the event where Mrs. Fluff is in all her glory and the princesses of the floral world reign supreme—opened yesterday in the gardens of the Bureau of Plant Industry, of the Department of Agriculture, Fourteenth and B streets northwest. The display this year is larger and more luxuriant than ever and will continue until next Wednesday.
