GREGORY ACCEPTS A JAIL SENTENCE

Trading Stamp Concerns to Test District Code.

The trading stamp concerns began their final fight against the District code making their business illegal yesterday, when Walter J. Gregory, of the Sperry-Hutchinson Company, was sentenced to jail in default of a \$100 fine. On the advice of his attorneys, Mr. Gregory refused to pay the fine so that they may begin habeas corpus proceedings on the ground that the Police Court is without jurisdiction in the matter and that the conviction is illegal.

After he was sentenced to serve five months in jail by Judge Mulowny, in Police Court yesterday morning, Mr. Gregory placed himself in the hands of a marshal of the court and was driven to the jail in a taxicab, where he was turned over to Warden McKee.

Shortly after he was sent to the jail, his attorneys appeared before the Supreme Court of the United States and filed a petition for a writ of habeas corpus and the release of the prisoner. Corporation Counsel Thomas opposed the motion and the court gave him until to-day to prepare a brief protesting against the issuance of a writ.

The cases of other concerns in Washington, who are engaged in a similar business, will remain in abeyance, pending the final decision in the Gregory case.

REMOVED FROM MORGUE.

Body of William A. Little to Rest at Fredericksburg.

The body of William A. Little, at one time a leading figure in Virginia politics, who died Saturday at the Washington Asylum Hospital from the effects of alcohol, was removed from the morgue yesterday and now rests in the undertaking chapel of E. S. Hines.

The body will be shipped to Fredericksburg, Va., to-morrow, and will be interred in the family lot there.

HUMANE SOCIETY MEETS.

Daring October Eighty-four Bands of Mercy Were Organized.

The regular monthly meeting of the executive committee of the Washington Humane Society was held yesterday afternoon at the offices of the society. Mrs. Winfield S. Schley, Miss Mary S. Lawrence, Miss Phebe A. I. Howell, Mrs. M. M. Selenthal, Mrs. L. B. McDonnell, Miss Florence Twitchell, Miss Eliza C. Fawcett, and Miss Jeannette Jewell were elected to membership.

The secretary reported that during the month of October the agents of the society had examined 85 animals and prosecuted cases of cruelty in 15 instances, securing 115 convictions.

An additional agent was appointed during the month, making a total of eight now employed by the society in actively enforcing the anti-cruelty laws of the District.

During the month of October eighty-four bands of mercy were organized in the public schools of the District, with a total of 2,198 enrolled members. The total membership in the public schools now exceeds 15,000.

Mrs. George Thompson Prewitt opened a series of readings on "Western women in foreign lands" yesterday morning at the weekly meeting of the Women's Interdenominational Missionary Union at Luther Place Memorial Church. Mrs. Prewitt's lecture was followed by a Bible reading by Mrs. Fred Beall.

DR. WILEY ON ATHLETICS.

Impresses Need of Physical Education in All Schools.

Dr. Harvey W. Wiley spoke on the needs of physical education in the first of a series of winter lectures at the Friends School yesterday. He gave it as his belief that athletics in schools should be compulsory, and scouted the idea that dangerous sports ought to be abolished.

Dr. Wiley closed with an expression of the hope that the time was not far off when we should have in this country a systematized education, in which government supervision of the private as well as the public school would tend to make more uniform and trustworthy the standards of all schools.

GETS MEDAL FOR BRAVERY.

President Taft paid honor to the bravery of an American officer of cavalry yesterday when, in the executive offices, he presented to Lieut. Gordon Johnston, of the Seventh Cavalry, the Congressional medal of honor for bravery in action. Gen. Leonard Wood, Chief of Staff, U. S. A., and several of the President's aids were present in full uniform.

Lieut. Johnston displayed particular bravery in an action with the Moros at Budidajo in 1906, volunteering to lead a forlorn hope against a Moro stronghold. He was severely wounded. Lieut. Johnston showed his quality at other times in the Philippines, and was twice commended for bravery.
