Market Entirely Controlled by Manipulation.

GREAT BLOCKS TOSSED ABOUT

Employees of Pool Force Up Prices by Huge Transactions in United States Steel and Union Pacific.

New York, Nov. 16.—Persons in Wall street, if there were such, entertaining any illusions as to the character of the present stock market, had an opportunity to-day to be completely undeceived, since rarely has the fact that the market is solely and absolutely controlled by manipulation been so openly disclosed.

Prices opened with little animation at about the same, or in some instances slightly higher, prices than those at which they closed in the afternoon before. Then the hand of the operating clique being removed and values left to follow their natural course the market slowly receded until the principal stocks were off at a point.

Dull Until Closing Hour. Support was next rendered, but activity was not inclined in the last hour of business, and for a long time during the middle of the day, and indeed up to the closing half hour, transactions were on a scale so small that if the entire day's dealings had been continued at the same rate the volume of transactions would hardly have been more than 500,000 shares.

But suddenly the two or three brokers chiefly employed by the pool made their appearance on the floor of the stock exchange near the posts set apart for dealing in United States Steel and Union Pacific stocks. Violent and extraordinary churning at once began in these shares, great blocks of stock being tossed about as if they were only hundred-share lots, and the prices of these shares were within a short time marked up over a point and closed at the high figures.

Dealings were small in nearly all other stocks, and, although these stocks advanced under the lead of Union Pacific and Steel, there was no real improvement in the market. Buying for the account of commission houses was utterly lacking and there was at no time the slightest pretense that anything less than pool operations were a factor in business.

There was almost nothing in the day's news on which either buying or selling of stocks could be predicated. Dispatches from Washington stated that it was considered highly probable that in a speech to be made before the Railway Business Association in this city next week the chairman of the Interstate Commerce Commission might intimate that for his part he was favorable to an increase in freight rates.

Should he take this ground in his forthcoming remarks, he will say that which will surprise nobody, and for that matter it has been all along perfectly well understood in the financial district that a moderate increase in railway freight rates will most certainly be granted by the Interstate Commerce Commission, although the time for taking this action may be longer away than is commonly expected.


