Operators Decline to Trade in an Artificial Market.

GENERAL CRITICISM IS HEARD

Traders Have Not Forgotten the Usual Fate that Attends "Pegged" Market—Good Support in Evidence at the Close—Sharp Rise in Cotton Follows Government Report.

New York, Nov. 21.—One hundred and seventeen thousand shares of stock were bought and sold in the first hour of business on the stock exchange to-day.

The record of these transactions in itself forms a sufficient commentary upon the peculiar character that the stock market has lately come to assume.

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Some Inactive Stocks Sell. In to-day's early dealings General Electric, International Steam Pump, Westinghouse, and two or three other industrial stocks, almost entirely of the industrial list, attracted attention by an advance, while the rest of the market was either but barely steady or actually declining.

The most notable development to-day was, perhaps, a sharp rise in the price of cotton, based upon the publication of the government's report for November 14, which, inasmuch as it showed an increase of only 60,000 bales over that for the same period in 1909, was not taken as indicating a season's cotton crop in excess of 1,500,000 bales.

The upward movement in cotton, consequent upon this, was assisted by the appearance of an estimate of the crop by an expert, whose guesses last year proved to be exceedingly accurate, that the year's crop would be less than 11,900,000 bales.
