EXPERT UNDER INDICTMENT

Prosecution Calls High Judge of Art to Testify, and It is Found that He Has Been Held for Running a Gambling House-Blackmail Case Explodes.

Tours, Dec. 23.—The fourth day of the trial of the "Count" d'Aulby de Gatinny and his wife on the charge of extorting \$300,000 from Mrs. Charles Harrison Payne, now the Duchess de Choiseul Prasin, through the sale of spurious pictures to her late husband, opened in a way that the defense considered favorable. Desmoullins, the noted artist, testified that he had inspected the collection which d'Aulby sold the Paynes, and was agreeably surprised to find that the pictures were good enough to deceive the ordinary man.
