IN THE MUSIC WORLD.

Mrs. Fannie Bloomfield Zeisler, one of the most popular pianists that ever appeared before American audiences, has been engaged to play in Washington Thursday afternoon, January 12, at 4:30 o'clock, for the Colonial School for Girls. Pianists like Mme. Zeisler are an engaging and uplifting moral as well as musical force in the public life. The circumstance that this remarkable woman is proud to call herself an American, although of Austrian descent, should stir musical countrymen with a thrill of satisfaction at the thought that a generation which is supposed to be devoted slavishly to the sordid and mercenary ambitions can produce in art such a commanding personage, imbued with only the highest ideals and loftiest esthetic aspirations. The programme is as follows:
