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SCORE SNOW BILL AS AN INJUSTICE

East Washington Citizens Have Busy Session.

PLAN TO CLEAN PAVEMENTS

Commissioners Asked to Favor Special Tax to Defray Expenses of District Doing the Work—Upward Tendency of Gas Bills is Remoaned and Also Denied by Members.

Arraigning the Dillingham snow bill on the grounds that it was unconstitutional and that it would not clean the streets, the East Washington Citizens' Association last night appointed a committee to ask the District Commissioners to frame a bill that would take the place of the Dillingham bill.

Another important matter which the association urged was an investigation of the Washington Gaslight Company, charging that the more the price of gas goes down the higher are the bills.

Addresses were made by Capt. W. M. Potter, Mr. Hildreth, Mr. Weller, and Mr. Smith, condemning the unconstitutionality of the bill, and claiming that Congress could not force residents to clean the sidewalk in front of his house any more than he is expected to clean the street.

Let the District Do It.

The committee will suggest to the Commissioners that they frame a bill imposing on the District the duty of removing the snow from all sidewalks within the limits of the District. But to defray the expenses of this, there should be a tax levied for a period of three years of two cents per foot on the frontage of houses, which, they estimated, ought to bring in \$100,000 per year.

A Municipal Job.

Snow cleaning from the sidewalks, they claimed, was a municipal responsibility, and that there was no reason why the Commissioners could not have the sidewalks cleaned in much the same way as the street.

Would Extend Tracks.

The street railroad committee reported that it had asked the Capital Traction Company to extend its lines from Fifteenth and Pennsylvania avenue southeast to H street northeast, and to continue its line from F street to Fifteenth street northeast.
