SIGNAL HONOR GIVEN ENGINE COMPANY 21

Macfarland Trophy and Medals Presented at Banquet in Engine House in Lanier Place.

Every officer and member of Engine Company No. 21 was presented a handsome silver medal bearing the name of the company, the Macfarland trophy in miniature, and the name of the recipient, at the testimonial banquet given last night by the citizens of the neighborhood of Lanier place.

Commissioner Johnston inspected the engine and truck companies, after which everybody marched to the second floor, where a banquet was served. M. O. Leighton acted as toastmaster. He paid tribute to the company, and told of his own experiences twenty years ago in the State of Maine, as a volunteer fireman. George O'Connor followed with popular songs. "The race to the swift" was responded to by Rabbi Abram Simon, who said Congress should understand that this city should be provided with the most modern fire-fighting equipment.

Commissioner Johnston gave a short history of the Macfarland trophy, a silk American flag. The speaker also advocated high-pressure mains in the business section of the city.

Commissioner Johnston then presented the trophy to Capt. Edward O'Connor, who made a fitting response.

Mr. Macfarland responded to "The growth of the fire department." Dr. William C. Woodward presented the officers and members of the company the silver medals on behalf of the citizens of the neighborhood. Justice Wendell Phillips Stafford, in the toast "The recompense of a public servant" said firemen are not mere wage-earners, but should be placed side by side with the soldier and sailor enlisted in the service of their country.

"LA BOHEME" WELL SUNG.

French Grand Opera Company in Another Success at Belasco.

"La Boheme" than which there are few more dramatic or tuneful operas, was presented by the French Grand Opera Company of New Orleans at the Belasco last evening before a large audience, which appeared to drink in each well-known air as if welcoming and appreciating it to the fullest extent; it has been a long time since Puccini's composition has been heard in this city. But the applause which greeted each familiar solo, duet, or chorus plainly showed that the opera had lost nothing either by reason of its absence or by its rendition last evening.

To Mlle. Rolland, whose Mannon and Violetta charmed audiences earlier in the week, belongs the chief share of the praise due for the extremely creditable performance last evening. It was she who, from the very moment of her first entrance with the beautiful solo "My Name is Mimì," captivated the audience and held its attention until the very last moment, when, dying of consumption, she breathes out her love for Rodolphe in one of the most tender, saddest, but withal one of the most tuneful bits of the entire score. Mlle. Rolland makes an ideal Mimì from a physical standpoint, and her voice—sympathetic, clear, and resonant—earned for her many encores last evening. Particularly good was her rendition of the duets with Rodolphe and Marcel in the first and third acts and in the death scene preceding the final curtain.

Mlle. Cortez, who sang the title role in "Carmen" on Tuesday, was entrusted with the role of Musetta, her mezzo-soprano voice blending excellently with the tenor of M. Morati and the baritone of M. Montano in the famous sextet in the second act. Taken in its entirety, the opera was one of the best sung and best acted productions which this company has given, and the fact that it will be repeated at the Wednesday matinee next week will doubtless attract a large number of those who stayed away last night for reasons religious.
