PRACTICAL SUGGESTIONS FOR BUSY HOUSEKEEPERS

Apple dumplings as a German housewife makes them have a stiff batter for a foundation, with apples, peeled, cut into dice, stirred into it, and the apple batter is dropped in small pieces into boiling water and boiled until they are cooked through.

An attractive salad of cherries is filled into half orange shells and served on white lettuce leaves. Drain the liquor from a can of the fruit and dress the cherries with oil and vinegar. Then fill them into the shells and put a generous allowance of mayonnaise on the top of each.

For a snappy spring salad cut new boiled beets into slices, toss them together with diced hard-boiled eggs, dress with oil and vinegar, sprinkle with minced chives, and season with French dressing. Serve on a bed of crisp.

An old-fashioned way to make a bread pudding is also a tasty way. Butter slices of bread and make a custard of four eggs, four tablespoons of sugar, and a quart of milk. Turn the custard into a baking dish and cover the top with slices of bread that have been buttered, with the butter side up. Bake until the custard is set and serve cold. Children are sure to be fond of the dish.

For a tasty cheese dish cook half a minced onion in a tablespoonful of butter until it is slightly brown and then add a tablespoonful of flour and stir until it has cooked for three minutes, but do not brown it. Add a pint of milk and stir until it boils. Then turn in about
