Chicago, May 13.—Washington defeated the White Sox 11 to 6 in the closing game of the series at the South Side Park to-day. It was a see-saw battle, first one and then the other holding the lead. The Nationals, however, finally edged ahead in the seventh, and maintained the lead to the finish.

A fine Saturday crowd turned out to see the final game with the Nationals, probably 8,000 persons being on hand. McIntyre opened the first inning with a bounce over second base for a single. Lord's hot one was knocked down by the pitcher, but, too, was a base hit. Mottly going to second. Callahan bunted the two men another notch farther, and then, with the infielders drawn in, Ping Bodie cut a safe past Cunningham that scored both Bodie and Lord and Ping took second on the throw home. Collins came next and batted a double along the left field line, sending Ping home. Tannehill rounded out, Collins moving to third. Corhan drove a liner at Dixie Walker, who, Dixie knocked it down, but it bounced away for a base hit and Collins scored. Sullivan forced Corhan at second, ending the fracas.

A lightning double by the Sox got a large out of a tight place in the opening inning, when he seemed to look contrite. He passed the first man, and then Henry lined a terrific drive toward right-center, but Tannehill jumped into the air, stabled it, and threw to Collins, doubling Milan, who was nearly to second.

In the second inning Lange began wildly swing and passed Gessler. Gessler singled to left, and Callahan made a bad error of the ball. It got away from him and rolled to the bench, letting Elberfeld go to third and Gessler to second. With this critical situation Lange settled down and fanned three men in a row. Cunningham, McBride, and Henry being the victims.

Nationals Score First Run.
A homeless piece of fielding by Callahan and Corhan, who got mixed on a fly ball, gave the Nationals their first run in the third inning. There were two outs when Corhan singled to center. Lelievre then popped one to short left and bodied Callahan and Corhan went after it. The result was that the ball fell to the ground and bounded away from both of them, Call making a final effort to get it. Lelievre made a double out of the mess and Corhan raved all the way home. Callahan timely recovering the ball and throwing to the plate, but it was too late. Lelievre went to third on the throw. This piece of business gave Lange out of his strike and he batted the next two men, filling the bases, but fanned the third and escaped another injury.

At the start of the fifth, a terrific three-base drive to the right wall by Lelievre opened the door for the Nationals' second run. Elberfeld followed with a sacrifice fly, bringing in the score. Lange then fanned the next two men.

After two were out in the Sox's half of the fifth, Callahan singled to center and then tried to steal a run for his team. With the pitcher standing in the box, he started to swipe second. Walker pitched the ball to Bodie, and Ping lined it to right. Callahan tried to come all the way home on it, but Gessler's throw was perfect and he was tagged by an inch.

Lange's willingness caused his finish in the sixth inning, as Duffy sent Scott to the rubber. Before Scott could settle, he passed Walker, hitting the bases. Milan then lined over second for a single, scoring McBride and Henry. Scott knocked down Corhan's hot grounder and got the man at first. Walker going to third and Milan to second. Lelievre, a left hander, was purposely walked, filling the bases against the Elberfeld catwomped a single off Scott's hand, scoring Walker and leaving the bases full. Gessler fanned. With two strikes called on Cunningham, Milan tried to steal home, but was tagged out, ending the disaster.

Oley Relieves Walker.
The Sox rallied in their half of the sixth and got one man home that tied the score. Walker then was taken off the slab and Oley, left hander, substituted. Zelder batted for McIntyre and fled to Gessler.

The Nationals forced to the front again in the seventh. Cunningham began with a single. McBride bounced one off Lord's set for a double, putting Cunningham on third. Henry singled to center, scoring both men. Oley fanned. Milan walked, and was forced out by Corroy and Lelievre struck out.

"Young" Young went on the slab in the ninth and trouble started. Tannehill fumbled Oley's grounder. Then Milan lined safely to left and stretched to a double, putting Oley on third. Corroy singled out to Collins, but Lelievre fanned. Oley, center, scoring Oley and Milan and going to second on the throw home.
