

# Free Sherry Hits First Game--Nationals Lose, 8 to 0

## NATIONALS WHITEWASHED BY TAIL-END ST. LOUIS

### Big Jack Powell Allows Only Three Scattered Hits. Final Count Is 8 to 0.

St. Louis, Mo., May 15.—The Nationals lost to-day's game because they could not connect successfully with "Big Jack" Powell's assortment of shunts and slants. Besides beating them, Powell rubbed it in by whitewashing them to the tune of 8 to 0. The visitors were absolutely powerless before the husky twirler.

Meanwhile the Browns unkindly walked over a number of Free Sherry's curves on the field. Eddie Hallinan and "Home-run" Hogan colliding with the sphere for three spots. Sherry was very slow and deliberate in his movements, and twice failed to cover first base when he might have retired his man. However, with but three lonely singles behind him it was never meant that he should win his first game in the American League.

The Browns got one in the very first inning. Sherten walked, took second on Austin's single to left and third when McLean forced Austin. He talked on a wild pitch by Sherry. In the third Myers beat out a bunt and was sacrificed by Powell. Sherten singled to center, and he and Myers scored when Austin's drive hopped over McFride's head.

In the fourth, Hogan singled, took second on an out and came in when Myers hit safely to left. In the next inning Austin walked, advanced on McLean's out and scored on Elberfeld's wild throw to get Hallinan.

Three runs were counted in the seventh. Austin singled to left and McLean walked, both scoring when Hallinan tripled to left. Hogan's terrific drive to right center for three bases sent Hallinan over.

Hughes has been taking things easy here in the Capital, working out enough to keep his arm in trim, and reports that he is in shape to go into the box any time Manager McAleer says the word.

Two years ago, during the Cantillon regime, Hughes won every game against the Naps. Previous to that time, he was always effective against the Clevelanders, and his first appearance this season, after a year in the minors, will be watched with considerable interest.

As the writer stated last week, Walter Johnson has been sent to his home in Coffeyville, Kans., for a few days, to recuperate.

Reports of Johnson's illness appear to have been somewhat exaggerated. That he is run down and suffering from a bad cold has been known for some time, and this seems to be about the extent of his ailment.

It is hardly likely that Johnson will be out of the game very long. His exceptional habits and fine constitution are sure to mitigate against any attack of grip or cold, and he will surely be on the job just when he is most needed.

Manager McAleer is confident that the big fellow will make good and is giving him every opportunity.

Dolly Gray is the logical choice against the Browns this afternoon. Here's hoping.

Fred Corbin, the groundnut man left in Atlanta by Manager McAleer, is now leading the Crackers at the bat, hitting .75.

### Ford Throws 14 Different Kinds of Balls to Batters

Russell Ford, the famous New York pitcher, throws balls as follows:

- No 1 Splitter—Breaks straight down, either slow or fast.
- No 2 Splitter—Breaks "in" for right-handed batters.
- No 3 Splitter—Breaks "out" for left-hand batters.
- Fast Curve—Starts straight, but curves near plate.
- Slow Curve—Much like Joe McGinty's "Old Sal."
- Slider—Glides fast, with little rotation.
- Crossfire—Same as Cy Young's "one best bet."
- Shootout—Approaches batter shooting inward.
- Fast Ball—Thrown straight with terrific force.
- Slow Ball—Mixed in with other deliveries.
- Dope Ball—Served slow to batter without rotating.
- Drop Ball—Not unlike Mathewson's "fadeaway."
- Raise a Ball—Thrown under-hand with great speed.
- Hop Ball—Thrown up and "jumps" nearing plate.
