APPEAL IS GRANTED IN OCCOQUAN CASE

Prisoners' Counsel Says He Will Sue Commissioners.

Justice Thomas H. Anderson yesterday ordered docketed an appeal from the decision of Corporation Counsel Thomas that the District has a legal right to detain prisoners at the Occoquan workhouse who are sentenced to less than twelve months' imprisonment, instead of committing them to the District jail. An appeal has also been made from the decision of Judge Edmund Waddill, of the United States Circuit Court, for the Eastern district of Virginia, who ruled the same as Mr. Thomas. The appeal will be heard before the circuit court of the Fourth United States circuit, which convenes at Richmond. The validity of the law will be the question in each of the appeals.

Attorney Matthew E. O'Brien, who is the counsel in the case in which the ruling of Judge Waddill on Thursday was handed down, said yesterday that he will bring suit against the District Commissioners for the false imprisonment of Edgar Fisk and William Alexander, who are serving twelve-month terms, and are confined at Occoquan.

Columbia Heights Residents Await Award of Prizes. People who have been doing their best to win prizes offered by the Columbia Heights Citizens' Association for the best kept lawns and gardens were on edge yesterday, for the first inspection of the premises was made by a special committee, consisting of Alton B. Carty, chairman; Gen. W. H. Forwood, and W. E. Andrews. Another inspection will be made in August, and the various gardens will be judged and prizes awarded.

PULPIT IS FLANKED BY ELECTRIC FANS

Rev. Zed H. Copp Will Preach a "Breezy" Sermon.

Members of the congregation of Bethany Chapel may anticipate a "breezy" sermon from the pastor, Rev. Zed H. Copp, to-morrow, for securely installed on either side of his pulpit are two electric fans, whose murmuring zephyrs play over the pews. Some one whispered last night that they thought he was going to preach to-morrow from the text, "What went ye out into the desert for to see; a reed shaken with the wind," and had the fans put in the chapel to add a touch of landscape realism to the sermon. But such is not the case, for Rev. Mr. Copp said himself last night that Samuel Bass donated them to the church and was coming to church himself to cool his heated brow.

It has been considered just possible by a few flippant parishioners, who, it is thought, have been affected by the heat wave that Rev. Mr. Copp put the fans in to counteract the fire and brimstone that is sometimes spouted from the pulpit like volcanic lava from a Vesuvius, but he remains firm in his statement that it is only out of consideration for the sufferers who listen to him every Sunday that he has advocated the installation of the fans to minister to their physical comfort, thus leaving him more time to strive after the spiritual and moral uplift.

It was at first claimed that the idea was impracticable, but the fans were turned on at a trial prayer meeting last Wednesday night, and members who were present say the only visible effect produced by the fans was to give to the prayers an upward lift on their journey through the rafters.

NO FEARS OF ICE FAMINE IS FELT IN WASHINGTON

Irregular Delivery, Which Has Alarmed Consumers, Due to Effect of Heat on Horses—Large Supply in Store.

With all its sweltering and oppressive weather, Washington need have no fear of an ice famine. A good many residents have become alarmed because their dealers have been somewhat irregular in delivering ice since the hot weather fixed its grasp upon the city, but the companies declare the irregularity is entirely a question of delivery and not of shortage.

Like all other merchants, the ice men have been handicapped by the effect of the heat upon their horses, many of which have been overcome, some of the cases resulting fatally.

RABIES NOT FOUND IN 56,000 STRAYS

Experiment in Philadelphia Has Gratifying Results.

Under the caption, "No Rabies in 55,995 Strays," Our Dumb Animals, a Boston publication given over to the protection of household pets and domesticated animals, reprints the result of a Philadelphia experiment that has caused widespread comment and no slight feeling of relief in many quarters. In fact, a certain circle of prominent women who have bitterly opposed the imposition of the stringent measures of protection which are now on the District statute books and police regulations have made it a point to see that reproductions of the article have received such circulation. The article reads: "In 1910 the Morris Refuge, of Philadelphia, cared for 55,995 stray dogs, but 25 of which were cats or dogs. Although 48 of these animals were reported to be mad, the officers of the refuge found that the report was not true in a single case."

ESTATE LEFT TO SONS.

By the will of William F. Dove, filed for probate yesterday, \$50 is left to his son, James H. Dove, and this residue to his son Thomas H. Dove, who is named as executor. The will states that the unequal division is made because the testator had advanced to the son James sums of money from time to time for which no return has been received, while Thomas has never received anything and had furnished a home for his father.

Suez Steamboat Company. Alleging that he was unlawfully detained in the hold of the steamer St. Johns when returning from Colonial Beach June 25 last, Charles T. Ball yesterday filed suit against the Potomac and Chesapeake Steamboat Company and Capt. Harry Randall for \$10,000 damages.
