CREAM, MILK AND TYPHOID, Etc.

Many epidemics of typhoid have been traced to raw milk. (Kobay.) In the typhoid epidemic of Canada in 1908 (over 200 cases within 10 days), only those who drank raw milk contracted the disease. (Hickman.) In England where little change was made from raw to properly pasteurized milk typhoid conditions immediately improved and the mortality rate decreased. (Hickman.) Typhoid is less frequent in countries where little raw milk is used. (Berliner.) It has been found that among persons of various ages, properly pasteurized milk and cream were consumed by very few cases of typhoid. (Hickman.) Disease germs live on or cling to the cream, which contains at least twelve times as many germs as the whole milk. (Hickman.) In Japan where little raw milk is used typhoid is practically unknown. (Hickman.) Milk trials and others have proved the reports that pasteurizing was harmful. Able sanitarians have often opposed this. Children and persons in a condition of weakness should not drink raw milk and cream; it is rarely safe to do so. Properly pasteurizing means heating to 160 degrees Fahrenheit for twenty minutes. Home pasteurizing is just as efficient. Commercial pasteurization is unreliable. MORAL: Never buy your property pasteurized milk unless you see the label and know it is to be pasteurized, then read and heed and covered with milk.

Society for Prevention of Sickness
