**AFFECTED BY CLIMATE.**  
Consul C. K. Moser Suffering from His Stay in Arabia.  
Following an operation in which several sections of bone were removed from his nose, Charles K. Moser, United States consul to Colombo, Ceylon, is confined to the Episcopal Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital with a severe attack of hemorrhage.  
Unless complications set in, he expects to leave the institution in a few days. Doctors say the hemorrhage is due to thin blood, caused by long residence in the hot climate of Arabia, where Mr. Moser has been stationed for several years.

**UNITARIANS MEET HERE TO-MORROW**  
Noted Clergymen and Laymen Coming to Capital.

**SESSION TO LAST FOUR DAYS**  
International Peace and Sociological Conditions in Which Church Can Be of Great Help Will Form Important Topics for Discussion. Women's Alliance to Take Part.

The national conference of Unitarian and other Christian churches, which began to-morrow morning, to continue in session through Thursday, promises to be one of the most important in the history of the organization, one of the largest religious bodies in the country. Leading clergymen and prominent laymen from all parts of the continent are here to attend the opening meeting in All Souls' Church to-morrow morning. The other sessions will be held in Memorial Continental Hall.

**Programme for Tuesday.**  
To-morrow will be devoted to religious services, and the active work of the conference will begin Tuesday. Tuesday morning's programme will include:  
Address by the president, Hon. Horace Davis, San Francisco, Cal.; report of the council by the chairman, Rev. J. G. B. Pierce, of Washington, and addresses by Rev. Lewis G. Wilson, Boston, Mass., secretary of the American Unitarian Association; Rev. W. J. Lawrence, Boston, Mass., president of the Unitarian Sunday School Society; Miss Emma C. Low, Brooklyn, N. Y., president of the National Alliance of Unitarian Women; Rev. Dudley Mays Ferris, Brockton, Mass., president of the National Young People's Religious Union; Rev. A. D. K. Shurtiff, Boston, Mass., secretary Unitarian Temperance Society; Cyril H. Burgess, New York, secretary of the Unitarian Laymen's League; and Rev. S. A. Elliot, D. D., Boston, Mass., representing the International Council of Liberal Religious Workers and Thinkers.

The meeting on Tuesday afternoon will be under auspices of the National Young People's Religious Union, and it will be followed by a reception in the conference in the Arlington Hotel, under auspices of the National Alliance of Unitarian Women.

International peace is the topic for the meeting Tuesday night. Addresses on the subject will be made by Rev. Edward B. Cummings, of Boston; Rev. Jenkin Lloyd Jones, of Chicago; and Rev. William G. Channing, of Rochester, N. Y. President Taft has been invited to address this session.

**Will Discuss Sociology.**  
A sociological session will be held on Wednesday morning with the purpose of outlining ways in which the church can be of greater help in adjusting sociological conditions. Addresses will be made by Rev. Elmer S. Forbes, of Boston, Mass.; C. W. Hebbard, secretary New York State board of charities, Albany, N. Y.; Prof. Edward C. Elliott, Madison, Wis.; Mrs. Florence Kelley, secretary National Consumers' League, New York; William D. Moulton, president Illinois civil service commission, Mrs. Anna Gurin Spaworth, New York School of Civic and Philanthropy, New York; and Hon. Charles B. Hall, Chicago.

Wednesday evening's session will be taken up with the subject, "Religion in education," the speakers being President C. F. Thwing, of Western Reserve University, Prof. F. W. Hooper, of Brooklyn Institute, and Frederick Winsor, of Concord, Mass.

The historical element in Christianity as a spiritual religion will be discussed Thursday morning by Prof. Francis A. Christy, of Meadville Theological Seminary, Meadville, Pa., of Boston, and others. "Religion and current forms of mysticism" will be dealt with by Rev. George E. Dodson, of St. Louis, Prof. J. H. Holmes, of Swarthmore, Pa., and the members.

The conference will terminate Thursday evening in a meeting, with the general topic, "Church unity." Addresses will be made by Rev. Samuel A. Elliot, of Boston; Rev. Minor Sweeney, of Cleveland; and Rev. Samuel M. Crothers, of Cambridge, Mass.

**ALLEGED AFFINITY PERHAPS A "SHE"**  
Husband's Tale of Transom Peeks a Fizzle.

Declaring that his wife has an affinity, George F. Harris, negro messenger in the Geological Survey, requested Judge De Lacy, in the Juvenile Court, yesterday, to revoke the recent order of the court that Harris pay \$20 a month for the support of his children. He asks also that the children be placed in his custody.

Harris said he first saw his wife with her affinity at a funeral. Later he went to his wife's room at 123 Third street southwest. Finding the door locked, he looked through the transom and saw his wife and her affinity. The wife, so Harris alleges, fired a fusillade of missiles at his head.

Witnesses for Mrs. Harris testified that the person whom Harris thought to be his wife's affinity was in reality a woman. Judge De Lacy refused to grant the petition of the husband.

**RARE MSS. GIVEN TO PUBLIC LIBRARY**  
W. F. Mattingly Donates Valuable District History.

William F. Mattingly has deposited in the District Public Library three folio volumes, being a transcript of the correspondence of the original Commissioners of the city of Washington, Thomas Johnson, Daniel Carroll, and David Stuart, during the year 1791 through 1794.

These manuscript volumes, all copied in beautiful handwriting, include transcripts of letters to and from George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Alexander Hamilton, Robert Morris, the governors of Maryland and Virginia, Andrew Elliott, Pierre l'Enfant, the original proprietors of the land of the District, and many others.

In sending the volumes to the Public Library, Mr. Mattingly wrote as follows to the librarian:

"These volumes were presented to me by Gen. Shepley many years ago, and I feel assured that this disposition of them would meet his approval. They contain very much of unique interest to the student of early history of the city, and I feel that they ought to be where they will be accessible in the future to all who take an interest in such things."

**WILL FIGHT LOAN BROKER.**  
Patron Says Money Lender Exact 40 Per Cent Interest.

To make a test case of the legality of notes given to money brokers who charge exorbitant rates of interest, George W. Barnes, a night watchman, will refuse to pay the remainder due a loan broker on a \$30 note, on which Barnes says he has made eight payments of \$15 each.

"Forty-six per cent is what they want me to pay," said Barnes, "and I'm not just. I do not want to beat the company of their just dues, but such a large percentage is unfair. I was forced to borrow the money when in straitened circumstances."

**MUST A TENOR SING!**  
Church Choir Contract Will Be Tested in Local Court.

The case of L. J. Miller, a tenor singer, who has been sued for breach of contract by Mr. Thomas E. Lee, pastor of St. Matthew's Church, will be heard in the Municipal Court to-morrow.

The suit is for \$100 damages, although the principle involved is of more importance, according to Attorney Charles J. Murphy, who appears for Mr. Lee. Mr. Murphy says the legality of church choir contracts will be tested.

It is contended that Mr. Miller made a contract, agreeing to sing for five years, but quit after the first service, having, so, he says, informed the choirmaster of his intentions.
