

District to Have Delegates

The Commissioners have been requested by A. D. V. The Commissioners have the matter under consideration.

BROAD TREATMENT URGED FOR CITY

National Board of Trade Wants Congress to Be Generous to the National Capital.

A resolution urging upon Congress and the Federal authorities the importance of giving every consideration to the local and adequate development of the National Capital, for the reason that the city belongs to the nation and appeals to the pride and patriotism of all the people of the country, was adopted by the National Board of Trade just before the close of its forty-second annual meeting at noon yesterday.

The resolution was presented by Charles H. Miller, of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce, on behalf of the Washington Chamber of Commerce and Board of Trade. It was prepared by H. T. Newcomb, a member of the latter organization.

Prominent committee assignments for the coming year were given the Washingtonians who were chosen delegates to the meeting as representatives of the two local commercial organizations. Albert Schultze, of the Washington Chamber of Commerce, was made a member of the committee on American merchant marine and a member of the council; George T. Worthington was placed on the committee on currency and banking; P. T. Moran, on the committee on corporations; A. D. Petrus, on the committee on international arbitration, and Frederick C. Handy, on the committee on the Panama Canal.

From the Washington Board of Trade Dr. A. E. Fardon was placed on the committee on American merchant marine; John Joy Edson, on the committee on currency and banking; H. T. Newcomb, on the committee on corporations; A. M. Read, on the committee on bills of lading and Federal inspection of grain, calendar reform, commercial education, and forest reserves; and Robert N. Harper was made a member of the committee on river and harbor improvement and sewage disposal.

Before adjourning the board elected the following officers for the coming year: President, William S. Harvey, of Philadelphia, first vice president, William Harris Douglas, of New York; second vice president, Walter P. Bishop, of Milwaukee, and treasurer, Walter Wood, of Philadelphia. Frank D. La Lanne, of Philadelphia, the retiring president, was not a candidate for re-election. He explained to the board that pressing business would prevent his serving again in the capacity of president.

MILK NOT UP TO STANDARD.

Proprietors of Twenty-three Lunch-rooms to Be Prosecuted.

Twenty-three informations against proprietors of lunchrooms for selling milk below the quality standard will be filed in the Police Court this morning by the District health department. The prosecutions are the result of a series of inspections, which have just been completed by inspectors.

WILL DISCUSS CITY'S NEEDS.

President to Confer with Noyes and Oyster Next Week.

At the request of President Taft, Thomas C. Noyes, president of the Board of Trade, and James F. Oyster, president of the Chamber of Commerce, will visit the White House one day next week to discuss matters pertaining to the welfare of the District.

The presiding officers of Washington's two commercial organizations were to have had a conference with Mr. Taft yesterday, but when they arrived at the White House they were told that other important business prevented his seeing them. The President said he would go to New York today, but desired a long conference with his visitors at an early date as possible.

The President again repeated his former statement that he is for the District first, last and all the time, and reiterated his intention to address Congress as to matters in which the people here are vitally interested. He would probably begin discussing the District message next week, he said, and before doing so he would discuss Noyes and Oyster to talk fully and freely with him.

Diet Flying at Panama.

Four-fifths of the excavation work upon the Panama Canal has been completed, according to reports received here yesterday. The total excavation at Panama up to January 1, 1912, was 2,662,360 cubic yards. There is left to be excavated 523,639 cubic yards, about one-fifth of the entire amount for the completed canal. The total for December, 1911, was 2,627,721 cubic yards.
