NEWS OF ALEXANDRIA

Prosecution's Case Against Lewis Hooff for Embezzlement Is Practically Complete.

Alexandria, Va., Feb. 2.—When the Corporation Court adjourned at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon practically all the testimony in behalf of the State, with the exception of that of one or two witnesses, was in at the trial of Lewis Hooff, former secretary and general manager of the defunct Mercantile Railway Building and Loan Association, charged with embezzlement.

The identification of a deposit slip was made by George H. Robinson, formerly teller at the Virginia State Deposit and Trust Corporation. This slip contained notes and checks as deposited. Other deposit slips were identified by him and money for building association was in several instances given by him to Harvey Downs.

George E. Warfield, cashier of the First National Bank, testified that the association on June 28, 1910, deposited at his bank a draft on a Baltimore bank for \$1,500 and a check on a local bank for \$500. The association also carried a dividend account at the First National Bank, he said.

Several deposit slips, which he had carried to the Virginia State Deposit and Trust Corporation, were identified by Harvey Downs. Money he received, he said, he turned over to Hooff.
