HELD FOR FIGHTER'S DEATH

Boxing Instructor at Naval Station May Face Trial.

Willard E. Walters, boxer, first class, U. S. N., is confined in the guardhouse at the naval training station, North Chicago, Ill., pending an investigation into the death of Joe Karnakowsky, prize fighter, known as "Doc Ketchell."

Following the match Ketchell became seriously ill, and during most of the time since then, until his death he was unconscious. The body, Capt. Fullam states, has been turned over to the civil authorities, and a coroner's inquest will be held.

GOVERNOR REFUSES TO PARDON BRANDT

Next Legal Step Will Be Appeal from Decision in Habeas Corpus Case.

New York, Feb. 23.—Refusing to-day to take advantage of the opportunity extended by Supreme Court Justice Gerard to grant a pardon to Felix E. Brandt, the former valet to Mother E. Schuff, whose sentence of thirty years for burglary has been declared illegal on a habeas corpus writ, Gov. Dix brought about the decision of the court himself, and the high legal authorities of the State, and now stands alone between Brandt and freedom, despite the pleas of the Supreme Court, the attorney general, and the district attorney of New York.

Yesterday Gov. Dix issued a statement to the effect that the decision of Justice Gerard sustaining Brandt's habeas corpus writ legally grants the young man executive clemency. Justice Gerard quickly wired the governor that the writ had not been signed and that he would delay signing it until the governor had granted Brandt a pardon. To-day the governor insisted that he still had no right to grant the pardon, maintaining that "the moral effect of the decision of Justice Gerard is to grant the young man executive clemency."

The next legal action in the case will probably be an appeal from the decision of Justice Gerard on the habeas corpus writ. The grand jury investigating the case returned to-day that the alienists who examined Brandt in Schuff's office two days after his arrest, and in the hospital at Sing Sing, made a second examination of Brandt in the Tombs prison several days afterward. In both tests they "found Brandt sane."

PLAN TO BOOST SOUTHERN TRAVEL

Dr. Owens, of Southern Commercial Congress, Outlines Scheme for Diverting Tourist Trade.

The plan for the publication of from one to five million copies of a booklet of the railroad folder type, advertising Washington and twenty-seven other cities of the South, for the purpose of diverting tourist travel through that section of the country, was outlined to members of the publicity committee of the Southern Commercial Congress, which met in the city of Washington, yesterday.

The proposed booklet is to be prepared for the All-South conference by the Southern Commercial Congress. It will advertise Washington as the gateway of the South. The title of the publication will be "The Land of the South and Home." It is proposed to have it distributed throughout the United States and other countries by having it placed in the hands of the bookstalls of the Southern Railway system.

DAVIS BODY COMING HOME

The State Department yesterday was notified by the American consulate at Cuba, Havana, that the body of Capt. David G. Davis, who was drowned several days ago, has been embarked on the steamer Celba for shipment to the United States.

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HAS GEN. OSPINA BEEN RECALLED?

Latest Advices from Bogota State Secretary Knox Will Be Welcomed in Colombia.

Has Gen. Ospina, the Minister from Colombia to the United States, been recalled or has he not, and will Secretary of State Knox visit Colombia?

These two questions are puzzling diplomats and American officials who are interested in the Colombian situation. Acting Secretary of State Wilson yesterday declined to say whether Mr. Knox would include Colombia in his itinerary, but would include Colombia in the Colombian Agreement has notified the State Department that it would be pleased to have Mr. Knox drop around Mr. Wilson's office.

Mr. Wilson stated he was not informed concerning the recall of Gen. Ospina, which was announced in press dispatches from Bogota. Senor Ospina himself declared that he was still without any advice from the duties of Minister until he was officially recalled. He declined to receive calls at the legation yesterday, however, being engaged in showing the father and mother of a young man who has arrived for a visit, about the city.

Acting Secretary Wilson, after a lengthy conference with the President yesterday afternoon, announced that the information at hand concerning Colombia was a cablegram from Mr. Du Bois, the American Minister at Bogota, in which he stated that he was officially recalled to the United States.

CHALONER PLEADED AT LOSING CASE

Says Delay in Lacey Hearing Will Result in Reforming Laws of New York.

New York, Feb. 23.—John Armstrong Chaloner to-day lost in his attempt to recover \$250,000 from Thomas T. Sherman, committee of his estate, when Judge Holt, in the United States District Court, directed the jury to bring in a verdict for the defendant. Judge Holt ruled that the proceedings in the case were irregular and that the plaintiff must secure a reversal of the commitment order.

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NAVY VALET, O'DONOGHUE, AUTHORITY DEAD

Prof. Philip R. Alger, of Annapolis, Was Known the World Over as an Expert.

Annapolis, Md., Feb. 23.—Prof. Philip R. Alger, a noted mathematician and authority on naval ordnance, for the last twelve years an instructor in the department of mathematics at the Naval Academy, died at the naval hospital in Annapolis, following an operation performed a short while before. The operation was for hemorrhage, and it was performed as the final effort to restore the patient to health.

Prof. Alger is survived by a wife, two daughters, and two sons. In the death of Prof. Alger the navy loses one of its most brilliant officers. Born in Massachusetts fifty-four years ago, Prof. Alger entered the service as a cadet midshipman on September 25, 1878. He graduated with the class of 1880, after attaining a remarkable record as a student. He was regarded as one of the leading authorities on ordnance in any navy.

On June 16, 1898, he was transferred to the department of mathematics at the Naval Academy, and had been on duty here continuously ever since. In the fall of 1900 he was appointed to serve on every important ordnance board detailed by the Navy Department. Prof. Alger was for many years secretary-treasurer of the United States Naval Institute, a learned and high school officer all over the world, and in that capacity edited the quarterly publication issued by that body. This volume is devoted to the study of naval ordnance and is published by the officers, and under Prof. Alger's management it became the leading publication of its kind in the world.
