Judge Rules Against Times Because Paper Containing Story Had Not Reached Washington.

New York, April 6.—The New York Times did not have the stories of Amundsen's trip to the south pole copyrighted at the time that paper published in black type the information that copyright had been obtained...

These facts were decided today by Judge Lacombe in the United States Circuit Court of Appeals when the judge refused to make permanent a temporary injunction sought from Judge Holt in behalf of the Times...

Judge Lacombe refused to grant the injunction upon the ground that the Times article was not copyrighted at all at the time when it boldly printed the copyright line...

This decision is of great interest to newspapers. Under it there is hardly any "copyrighted" article that is entitled to the protection...

Nearly all of the copyrighted news stories and articles that bear the warning line are in the hands of the reading public before the papers containing them are received in Washington...
