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SPAIN ORGANIZES TRAVEL SCHOOL

Organization Will Acquaint Hurried Tourists of Glories of the Castilian Kingdom.

For the purpose of acquainting the hurried traveler with the glories, culture, and progress of Spain, the Spanish Consulate in this city has adopted the novel plan of establishing a holiday lecture and travel course for the benefit of foreigners. This information was received by the United States Bureau of Education in the form of an official announcement furnished by the Spanish Legation at Washington.

The course is separated into two divisions. The first part, which is under management of Prof. Ramon Menéndez Pidal, will afford the foreigner an opportunity to acquaint himself with the fundamental ideas of the Spanish culture. The second part of the course consists of excursions to public, historical, architectural, and art monuments, under the conduct of scholars whose demonstrations, according to the communication from Senor Don Blas y Capasa, the Spanish Minister, "cannot but be incomparably superior to those offered by professional guides." The course will be held in Madrid as a headquarters from June 15 to July 15, those who enroll are expected to have some knowledge of Spanish.

The lectures will give special attention to the Spanish epic, to the drama as developed in various provinces, to the sacred and regional novel, and to Cervantes. Other lectures will deal with the relations of the Spanish language to the French and Italian literatures, to the "Mudéjar" art, and with the political and social life of Spain in the sixteenth century. There will also be two illustrated lectures surveying Spanish art.

The principal museum of Madrid, especially the Prado, the Modern Art Museum, the Archaeological Museum, and the Royal Armory will be taken to Toledo, Cordoba, Avila, and Segovia. These trips will be in the charge of Dr. Manuel R. Cosío and Dr. Manuel Gomez Moreno, two authorities upon their subjects.

Red Cross to Show First Aid Methods

Special Exhibit of Life-saving Devices and Illustration of Their Use to Be Made at Annual Conference Starting Tuesday.

The conference committee of the American Red Cross announced the programme yesterday for the ninth annual International Red Cross conference, which begins in this city Tuesday, continuing until May 12. The programme will furnish some brilliant addresses and several interesting features, and will be opened Tuesday afternoon in the Pan-American Building by Senator Root, of New York, who has accepted an invitation to substitute for President Taft, who was originally scheduled to make the opening address, but who will be unable to attend.

Wood was received at the headquarters of the society, room 31, State Department, yesterday that the Chinese government has appointed as its representative at the conference Minister Chang and Young Kwai, first secretary of the legation.

Nearly all the delegates are in Washington, and the meeting is opening Tuesday afternoon there will be the most representative attendance in the history of the organization. All the countries will have a place on the programme, and the papers that will be read promise to prove of great interest.

Remembers Hevlie. The exhibition building, built in the form of a huge cross in the rear of the Pan-American Union Building, resembled a heve tree yesterday, with the preparations going on for the exhibits brought here by the delegates of the various countries. Eugene Mattis Pedrovic, Director of Hevlie, has provided a fund, the income from which provides for the distribution of \$100 in prizes to be awarded in contests in all branches of Red Cross activity.

What promises to be the most interesting session of the conference will be that of next Saturday. This will consist of an exhibition by Boy Scouts, firemen, and policemen, trainmen, the Naval Hospital Corps and miners. These various industries will be divided into teams which will compete for medals in first-aid contests.

The miners will probably give the most interesting exhibition of all. A miniature shaft will be erected, and a real explosion will be staged on the exhibition field, which is located just outside the building. The safety helmets which have enabled the miners in the past to effect their escape will be worn by the exhibitors, and real rescues will be made.

Dr. M. J. Shields, Superintendent of the Red Cross car, which has traveled thousands of miles, instructing miners in first-aid methods, will be in charge of the exhibition, and visitors will be shown through the car.

On May 25 miscellaneous business will be discussed. This business will include a discussion of new regulations for the distribution of the fund given by Emperor Pedrovich, measures for increasing the American
