# COLONEL IS CHOICE OF BUCKEYE VOTERS

## Harmon and Roosevelt Named Ohio's Choice for Party Leaders—President Carried Only Three Congressional Districts.

# CRUSHING DEFEAT FOR TAFT; HARMON'S MAJORITY 2 TO 1

Columbus, Ohio, May 21.—Ohio voters said they favored Roosevelt and Harmon for the Presidency to-day in the State Presidential primary over Gov. Woodrow Wilson and President Taft. The State has apparently repudiated the President, who campaigned for seven days in his home State and received the support made by Gov. Harmon during the last week. Gov. Wilson made no campaign, although Col. Bryan twice crossed the State, making appeals for him and savage attacks on Gov. Harmon.

Senator Winthrop Murray Crane of Massachusetts publicly announced yesterday that he would not be a candidate for re-election to the Senate. His term will expire March 2, 1913. The Senator made the following statement of his position:

# SAR ARCHIBALD SIGNED NOTES

## Witnesses Outline 'Deals' in Which Jurist Is Alleged to Have Reaped Profit.

# SAID TO HAVE ACQUIRED SHARE IN GOLD MINE

## Averted that He Dabbled in All Kinds of Investments—One Note Unpaid.

Three "deals" in which Judge Archibald is supposed to have been interested, two of which were with coal and the third with a railroad company, yesterday occupied the attention of the House Judiciary Committee, which is now investigating the judge as a conspirator in a suit and counter-suit between the Commercial Court officials.

The first "arrangement" was a \$2,000 note for the purchase of a Honduras gold mine, and the details were brought forth in the testimony of H. C. Reynolds, attorney for the Boland Brothers, Wallace H. Ruth, cashier of the Stratton bank wherein the note was discounted, and W. W. Rinsler, treasurer of the Old Plymouth Coal Company, appearing before the judge as a witness in the suit and counter-suit between the Commercial Court officials.

# CANDIDACY CAUSED TROUBLE

# ST. JULIUS WERBER DIES

London, May 21.—St. Julius Werber, the eminent and widely known financier, died at his residence here to-night. Sir Julius was for years a member of the firm of Werber, Bell & Co., perhaps the largest diamond miners in the world. His mines in South Africa are still in operation.

# Fog Delays Air Voyage

St. Martin, France, May 21.—Fog to-day thwarted the attempt of Aviator Hamed to fly from Paris to London with a woman passenger. Hamed left the Isny aerodrome at 4 o'clock, accompanied by Miss Elizabeth Davis. Upon reaching this place a landing was made, as the channel fog was so thick that the birdman feared to venture into it.

# Trolley Car Strikes Auto

Jacksonville, Fla., May 21.—A. M. Cash, secretary of the firm of Cash Brothers, limited, automobile supply dealers, and Mrs. Cash were fatally injured shortly before noon to-day when an automobile in which they were riding was struck by a trolley car at Bay and Market Streets.

# SECRET SERVICE PROBE PROBABLE

## Suspended Agent Says Former Crooks Hold High Office Under Chief Wilkie.

# OFFICIALS ACCEPT GIFTS

New York, May 21.—Otto F. Kinkead, an agent of the United States Secret Service, wrote a letter to-day to Chief John E. Wilkie asking for a full investigation of the ethics of the service. Kinkead was suspended last March on charges concerning which he has made continuous requests for a hearing but without success.

If an investigation is instituted, Kinkead promises to co-operate as far as possible in exposing what he says are grave and long standing abuses. Among them is the so-called "frame-up" in which a stolen automobile is committed to the arrest of innocent men.

# OFFICIALS BORROW MONEY

The allegation is also made that in violation of the rules of the Secret Service some superior officials had borrowed money recklessly, amounting to \$200,000 from \$25 to \$200 from subordinates. These loans were without security or interest.

Another rule which is said to be overlooked by not a few officials in executive capacity is that forbidding the acceptance of gifts. Kinkead is ready to present various instances where agents have received gifts, including barrels of lobster and a goat and cart.

The proposed investigation would be the first in the history of the department. The report that Kinkead had been in consultation with certain Senators and Representatives as to the steps necessary to initiate an investigation has caused all kinds of comment among Secret Service agents.

Although Kinkead was informed on March 12 last that he was suspended pending a full investigation, he says he has been unable to obtain a hearing or to learn on what proof the charges were preferred.

# COURT SAYS PROPER PLACE FOR VALET IS IN PRISON

New York, May 21.—The appellate division to-day decided a motion made by Mrs. Deane L. Towns on behalf of Pauline M. Brant for a stay of the previous order remanding him to Dannemora prison. The court says that no reason is shown why an order staying the proceedings should be granted and that if the judgment of the court is correct, "the proper place for the prisoner is in State's prison serving out his sentence."

# JAUREZ BATTLE EXPECTED DAILY; CRISIS IS NEAR

## Federal Army Gradually Forced Rebels Toward Border City—Last Stronghold.

# GUADALOUPE RECAPTURED

Col. Steever Doubts if Madero's Forces Will Risk a Fight So Near Border. Mexico City, May 21.—Gen. Huerta and his Federal army reached Guadalupe to-day and the rebel forces under Gen. Orozco retreated.

Zapalpa have taken Tres Marias and are now in possession of both camps. Two hundred Federal troops have retreated at Tuxtla, Gutierrez, and have fortified and are holding the town.

El Paso, Tex., May 21.—Another batch of Juarez is imminent, according to dispatches to-day from Chihuahua. Gen. Orozco's insurgent army is retreating toward Juarez, where it will make its final stand against the Federal troops under Gen. Huerta.

Mexican Federals have begun a movement to intercept the line of communication of the rebel leader Gen. Orozco, between Juarez and Chihuahua, according to dispatches received at the War Department late yesterday from Col. H. Z. Steever, commanding the United States Cavalry.

# REBELS RETAKE GUADALOUPE

The Federal forces took Guadalupe only two days ago, and the first detachment sent out against them from Juarez came running back in a few hours. Col. Steever reported. It was not believed that the Federals would attack Juarez at this time, for fear of causing complications with the United States. Col. Steever believes their latest move is in line with this policy of doing nothing to violate the sanctity of United States territory. He has extended his patrols to prevent any violation of the neutrality statutes along the border.

# ELEVENTH VOTE ELECTS BISHOPS

Rev. Dr. Henderson and Rev. Dr. Shepard Chosen by Methodist Convention. Minneapolis, Minn., May 21.—The Rev. Dr. Theodore K. Henderson, of Brooklyn, N. Y., and the Rev. Dr. W. O. Shepard, of Chicago, were elected bishops to the Methodist Episcopal Church to-night on the eleventh ballot.

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# ITALIAN CAPTURED INLAND

Rome, May 21.—The war office officially announced to-day that the Italians had captured the Turkish island of Kos after a sharp fight.

# TAFT MANAGERS HOPEFUL

The President has carried only the First, Second, and Thirteenth districts, and Roosevelt men are claiming they will dominate the State convention and elect the six delegates-at-large to the national convention. It is true, the State will stand Taft six to Roosevelt forty-two, a crushing defeat for the President. His managers continued hopeful in the face of bad news.

Harmon men claimed Ohio by close to two to one, on the basis of returns received at midnight in a very tight vote. They said his delegates would be elected in nearly every district, and that his friends would be in control of the State convention. Country districts yet to be heard from are expected to show up strong for Gov. Harmon, although the vote is much lighter than Harmon men had hoped.

In the twentieth and twenty-first districts in the neighborhood of Cleveland, the Governor has been beaten three to one, and the race is close in Hamilton County with the Governor leading by a nose. Franklin County is Harmon by two to one with a Harmon county convention. Washington County is three to one for Harmon, and the greater part of the southern section of the State is close. Some County went six to one for the Governor.

# ASTOR'S WIDOW WILL WEAR WHITE

Mrs. Force Persuades Her Daughter to Cast Aside the Deep Black Mourning. New York, May 21.—Mrs. John Jacob Astor, who at sixteen, was widowed by the Titanic disaster, will wear white, not black—as mourning for her husband. Mrs. Astor wished—indeed felt it obligatory on her—to wear the deepest mourning. But Mrs. Force, her mother, believes she is too young to drape herself with black cloth and black crepe. Both trousers and dresses are to be of white, as for the most important time of her life. For it is a fact established scientifically that parental influence is very powerful.

# CUBAN UPRISING GROWS SERIOUS

Government Claims to Have the Situation in Hand—Troops in Readiness. Havana, May 21.—It is admitted that the black uprising, which first reared its head last Saturday, is serious, although the government claims to have the matter well in hand. Several regiments of troops, in addition to the battalions already sent out, are being held in readiness in this city to be dispatched to any point from which may come a call for help.
