## GUATEMALA SENDS ENVOY TO CAPITAL

Dr. Don Luis Toledo Herrarte Returns Visit Made by Secretary of State Knox.

Senator Dr. Don Luis Toledo Herrarte, Secretary of State of Guatemala, arrived in Washington Sunday morning at 8:45 o'clock, having been sent as an envoy by President Cabrera of the Republic of Guatemala to return the courtesy of Secretary Knox's visit to Guatemala last March. Guatemala is thus the first country to pay a return visit to our Secretary of State.

At the station awaiting Dr. Herrarte were John Barrett, Director of the Pan-American Union; the military aid to Pres-

ident Taft; Chandler Hale, Third Assistant Secretary of State; Senator Don Joaquin Mendez, Minister of Guatemala to the United States, and Mr. R. S. Hitt, the American Minister to Guatemala. Senator Herrarte will be received this morning at 10 o'clock by Secretary Knox in the State Department, and in the afternoon will be greeted by President Taft at the White House.

Dr. Herrarte was in charge of the Guatemalan Legation in Washington during the years 1907, 1908, and 1909, and in 1910 was Minister to Chile and Argentina, delivering the closing address at the fourth Pan-American Conference in Buenos Aires. He also was formerly Minister to Cuba.

While in Washington Dr. Herrarte made many friends in both the diplomatic and social circles of the city, and during his stay here will be the guest at many dinners given in his honor. He is the most distinguished physician in Guatemala, holding a diploma from the Faculty of Medicine in Paris. He is a brilliant author and orator, a member of the Academy of Political Science and the Geographical Society, as well as many other so-

cieties in America and Europe. Recently the King of Italy conferred on him the honor of Commander of the Order of the Italian Crown.

Accompanying Dr. Herrarte is Senator Roberto Lowenthal, Secretary of the Legation of Guatemala, and a prominent attorney of Guatemala City.

## APPEAL TO WOMEN OF ARMY AND NAVY

Wives and Daughters of Officers in Both Services to Assist Titanic Memorial Fund.

Women of the United States army and navy, whose lives and training teach them the value of heroic courage, will back the movement of the Woman's "Titanic" Memorial to erect in the National Capital a great monument to the men who died on the ill-fated ship to save the women and children.

It was announced here to-day at the central offices of the organization that Mrs. Leonard Wood, wife of the chief-of-staff of the United States army, has perfected a plan for sending a personal letter to every woman in every army post in the United States, asking for contributions. It is the plan to put all the money thus received into one large sum, and contribute it to the Memorial Fund as coming from the women of the United States army.

The co-operation and contributions of the women of the navy have been sought in another manner. From the offices here letters have been sent out by Mrs. John Hays Hammond, secretary of the organization, to the wives of the principal officers and commanders of all the fleets and navy yards in the navy. To a number of these letters most encouraging replies have been received, and it now seems assured that the navy will be as active as the army in helping to build this memorial to heroic manhood.
