RAISED CHECK TO ROB COUNTRYMEN

Well Known Wilkesbarre Pole Is Sought by Washington Police.

Accused of robbing his countrymen by raising a check from \$5 to \$48, W. G. Bahava, alias Wladlaw G. Sawa, former secretary of the Wilkesbarre, Pa., branch of the Polish National Alliance, a delegate to all conventions of the organization for the last fifteen years, will know to police in the National capital and throughout this country and Canada, is being sought by Washington detectives on a charge of forgery.

It is charged that Bahava wrote a check for \$48, which he had no right to cash in the name of the Wilkesbarre educational committee of Wilkesbarre, of which he was secretary. It is alleged that he so skillfully raised the check to \$48 that he had no difficulty in cashing the paper at the Second National Bank of Wilkesbarre. He then fled.

A proprietor of a hotel, banking and stock agency, Bahava is known to police in every part of the Continent, but he is best known through his long affiliation with the Polish National Alliance, of which the Wilkesbarre Police Educational Committee is a branch. As Bahava has many friends in Washington, Chief of Police E. S. Zoeller, of Wilkesbarre, has requested the authorities here to make every effort to capture the fugitive.

SAHAVA is a Pole, forty-five years of age, five feet six inches in height, about 175 pounds in weight, and stout. He has thick blonde hair, a thick light mustache, light complexion and blue eyes. He usually wears a light gray suit and a dark straw hat. No trace of Bahava has been found in this city, but detectives say he will be found if he is hiding here.

SAHAVA yesterday was notified that a reward of \$25 had been offered for the arrest of Howard Gaskins, colored, held by a coroner's jury for the murder of his wife, Jennie Gaskins, colored, in Venona, Va., twenty years ago. Boys walking through woods found the body of the woman dangling by a rope from a tree, and a search for her husband showed he had fled to the city. The mayor of Venona has authorized another reward of \$25, half of which is to be paid by the town and half by the county. Howard Gaskins has such an unusual appearance that the authorities believe he will soon be identified as the man, though colored, the fugitive has light hair and a light mustache. He is almost white in color. Gaskins is about twenty-eight years old, five feet five inches in height and 160 pounds in weight. He stammers slightly and has a gold filling in an upper front tooth.

WANTS TO SEE POLICE LETTERS. In seeking to compel the District Commissioners to allow Attorney Charles H. Turner to inspect certain letters on file in the Police Department, Jeremiah O'Connor, a saloonkeeper at 10 Four-and-a-half Street Northwest, yesterday applied for a mandamus against the Commissioners. He alleges he requested through Attorney Turner leave of the Commissioners, but was refused. O'Connor expresses the fear that the letters contain reflections on the conduct of his business, and might affect him when he applies for a renewal of his liquor license.

POLICE DIRECTOR SUSPENDED. Constantinople, July 24.—Investigation of a plot to kill the Sultan resulted today in the suspension of the director of police and commander of the gendarmes. They will be tried on charges of treason and conspiracy. Officers from the Sultan's palace guard have been appointed to succeed them.

EUROPEAN WHEAT CROP SMALL. Estimates from Abruzzo. A cablegram, dated July 22, 1912, from the International Institute of Agriculture, Rome, Italy, has been received by the United States Department of Agriculture, giving the following information: For Hungary (including Croatia and Slavonia) the production of wheat is estimated at 107,264,000 bushels; rye, 52,200 bushels; barley, 70,200 bushels. For Hungary (not including Croatia and Slavonia), oats, 84,200 bushels. For Italy, production of wheat 174,000,000 bushels; rye, 1,000,000 bushels. For Belgium, production of oats, 44,000,000 bushels.
