STEVESTER IMPELTY OFFERS A REWARD Allegation of Police "Winking" at Gambling Stirs Head of Department.

EVERY DETECTIVE ORDERED TO RUN DOWN CHARGES Commissioner Rudolph Declares Inquiry Is Already Under Way in the District.

As a direct and forceful reply to charges that the police are permitting open gambling in the District, Maj. Richard Sylvester, superintendent of the Police Department, last night climaxed a day of excitement in the Municipal Building by offering a reward of \$200 for information leading to the conviction of persons conducting a gambling table and \$100 for information leading to the conviction of policemen guilty of gambling or permitting gambling.

But Maj. Sylvester lost no time yesterday in preparations to answer charges in the event that his department is subjected to a searching probe. He had hardly reached his office that orders began flying in every direction, and half an hour later the entire department was moving in the direction of the Municipal Building to the exposure of open gambling in theater lobbies on Sunday afternoon, which was published in The Washington Herald yesterday.

Commissioner Rudolph, who is directing the inquiry into the charges against the police, co-operated with Major Sylvester by issuing the following order to the heads of the various departments in the District government in an effort to ascertain the identity of the witnesses to the gambling in the theater lobby:

Order to the Chiefs. "You are requested to endeavor to ascertain at once who in the employ of the District government referred to as having witnessed bookmaking at a theater in this city last Sunday afternoon, and inform me without delay of his name or the name of any other employee who attended the theater on that day."

Victims Dam Measure. President Taft exercised his veto power on two measures yesterday. The other, authorizing the Dixie Power Company to construct a dam across the White River near Cotter, Ark., was vetoed because of a provision specifying that the dam might later revert to the State of Arkansas.
