HOW TO ARRANGE THE SLEEPING PORCH

The sleeping porch can be arranged on any upper porch or veranda, or on a flat roof by placing on the roof a wooden grating floor and surrounding it with a light railing. Calla Lily Cakes.

Three eggs, one cup sugar, one cup flour, two tablespoons cold water, one teaspoon baking powder, beat for five minutes. Put one tablespoon in each round tin and bake a delicate brown. This recipe makes twelve. It can be baked in tin covers the size of calla lilies, and must be eaten while they are hot. Take out of tin and shape them like a lily and run two toothpicks through where they will hold them in place until cold. Fill with whipped cream and dust with powdered sugar. Put four ounces of perfume in a quart of water and mix it well with an original package of mix. Sprinkle a teaspoonful of the mixture on the hair once a week and brush it out thoroughly. Thereafter wash the hair grow when everything is in an arch.

Sponge Cake.

Beat two eggs with a pinch of salt, very light, add one cup sugar, beat, then one-half cup flour, beat, another one-half cup flour mixed with one teaspoonful baking powder, or use one teaspoon cream of tartar, one-half soda, then beat, add flavoring and beat in one-half cup boiling water. Put in oven as quickly as possible; moderate oven; in about twenty minutes peek in cautiously.

Danish Prune Cake.

One cup of stewed prunes mashed fine, 1 cupful sugar, 2 tablespoons butter or lard, yolks of 3 eggs, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-4 teaspoon each of cloves, allspice and nutmeg, 3 cup flour with 1-2 teaspoon baking powder. Stir together with 1 cupful prune juice, stir little as possible. Bake in a loaf.

McKinley Cake.

Three eggs, three cups sugar, one cup butter, one cup molasses, one pound raisins, one cup sweet milk, one rounded teaspoon soda, all kinds spice, five cup flour. This makes two medium-sized loaves and will keep six months. Bake one hour in a moderate oven.

KELLY IS WILD AND NATIVITY IS BEATEN BY NINTH

"Finny" Walks Six and Hits Four Batsmen—That Tells the Tale.

DISPUTE OVER UMPIRE'S DECISION

Though a great little pitcher he was not altogether equal to the task against Ninth.
