Accommodation Accounts Opened at Small Advance on Prices.

COLLECTORS START CAMPAIGN TO-DAY

They Are Authorized to Seize Personal Property in Lieu of Payment.

C. M. Towers, Deputy Collector of Taxes, instructed his collectors in the gentle art of collecting yesterday. This morning they are to give the first of a series of real collecting demonstrations. They, first, are to present the District's bills; then make a strong plea for the money, and, failing to obtain it, are to sell the most likely article in sight.

They are supposed to collect something, be it only a baby grand. In all events, they are not supposed to return to the tax office empty-handed.

Last year, great quantities of prime Bourbon and other wine whiskeys were seized. One vault was so filled with this stuff that it was given the nickname of "the speakeasy" among the building employees. No tax sale of highballs ever took place, however, as the owners decided to part with their money rather than their spirits.

Seizures are contemplated for unpaid personal taxes amounting to \$40,000. All collections probably will not be made today, as it will take more time for a collector to transfer a kitchen range or a mahogany buffet to the office than it would a roll of bills. Besides, the collectors are instructed to accept a promise of prompt action, wherever they see something that particularly strikes their fancy. At many places they will doubtless call again.

The amount of unpaid personal taxes is very high this year. Seizures of property to be sold to pay these overdue taxes have been scheduled for some, but have been delayed, pending the return of Tax Collector Rogers. Mr. Rogers will be at his office this morning, and as Deputy Collector Towers has the force well trained, the campaign will begin at once.

BRIDGE HEARINGS TO BE HELD TO-DAY

Effort to Be Made to Get Drawbridges Over Anacostia River.

In connection with plans to improve the Anacostia flats, a hearing to determine whether certain bridges across the Anacostia River shall be equipped with draw spans at least 100 feet in width will be held in the office of Col. Langitt, engineer in charge of local river and harbor works, in the Southern Building, at 10 o'clock this morning.

There are four bridges in question. Two are railway bridges, the Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington bridge, south of Massachusetts Avenue, and the Washington Electric Railway bridge at Benning Road, and two are highway bridges, one at Pennsylvania Avenue and the other at Benning Road.

It is necessary to the proper improvement of the river flats that floats, dredges, and tugs be able to get up the river. This at present is not possible. With the construction of draw spans, the reclamation work can be rapidly carried forward.

The reclaimed flats will be used as parking. It is planned to make the river basin, which in this section will be broadened and deepened, both to pleasure and commercial traffic. Provided draw spans are not adopted, these craft would be confined between bridges and the river would remain closed both to pleasure and commercial traffic.

The proposed plan will carry out the approved plan for the improvement of the Anacostia, which calls for its opening to navigation for the north as Magruder's Bridge, near the District line. At present the flats are a great breeding place for mosquitoes and fever. The men of experience in the river and it is expected that the owners of the two railroad bridges will attempt to show that the bridges are not obstructions to navigation within the meaning of the law.
