

RACING AT LAUREL WILL START TO-DAY WITH FINE CARD

First of Notable Series of Events Over Local Course—Track in Good Shape

Laurel, Md., Sept. 26.—Despite the drawback by rain, the race course of the Maryland State Fair Association will be open and open when it is time to throw open the gates to the lovers of the thoroughbred to-morrow afternoon, when the second annual meeting under the management of H. C. Brown will be launched. With favorable weather conditions it is expected that the best attendance records of last fall will be smashed by many thousands.

No meeting ever held in the East since the sport was at the height of its popularity in New York State has caused such widespread interest, and plans have been made for the accommodation of an enormous crowd of those who have a warm feeling for the blue-blooded equine and there will be many hundreds housed at Laurel Park when the bugle call is heard for the first time within a year at the Anne Arundel County track.

The stables are rapidly filling, and by to-morrow, when the Havre de Grace contingent will flock here, every stall will be occupied. Owing to the enormous demand for stalls many horsemen have been compelled to split their stables, leaving half here and taking the other portion to Benning. At least 200 horses will be in shape at the former battle ground of the Washington Jockey Club, which will have enough horses within its territory to start a race meeting of its own. For instance, Charley Patterson, trainer for Robert Davies, the wealthy Canadian turfman, was compelled to drive twelve of his string of twenty-four off at Benning after having left the rest here on his arrival from Woodbine yesterday. Patterson traveled with his charges on board the Toronto special, which reached the city shortly before midnight yesterday.

Laurel's meeting this year will have no onlooker outside of Lexington. Last fall a majority of days conflicted with Falmale, while others will come before the gates, for the horses were here and they drew the crowds. Kentucky will not hurt this month's big meeting. Horsemen who could not win but seldom against the fields that will start here will prefer to remain in the Blue Grass State, where the game will be much easier. At the closing of the Kentucky circuit, however, there will be a number of shipments here, while others will come before the termination of the sport there.

Yesterday was marked by the unloading of several prominent racing establishments which came in from Toronto and Havre de Grace. Among other arrivals were H. C. Hallenbeck, Thomas McDowell, Albert Simons, and Tommy Healy, trainer for R. T. Wilson, one of America's most distinguished lights of the American turf, who came down from the Harford County course. Fifteen of the Wilson racers are now here and will be joined to-morrow by those Healy has entered.

PRACTICE HAMPERED.

Ithaca, N. Y., Sept. 25.—The old bugbear of late university work kept a majority of Cornell's best football men off the field until 5 o'clock to-day, and the practice of the squad was materially hampered. On account of the failure of the many players to show up the coaches abandoned their intention of reconstituting the team to-day and devoted practically all of the time to individual coaching.

It was learned to-day that P. A. Franklin, one of the leading candidates for guard, had sustained a fracture of his right collar bone in Saturday's game, and would be out of the practice for a month.

MEET AT HAVRE DE GRACE CLOSES

Jockey McTaggart, Under Contract to August Belmont, Rides Four Winners and a Second.

Baltimore, Md., Sept. 26.—The fall meeting of the Harford Breeders and Agricultural Association at Havre de Grace closed this afternoon and to celebrate the event, Jockey McTaggart, under contract to Mr. August Belmont, rode four winners and finished second on his second mount. McTaggart had the leg up on Gates, the heavily played favorite, in the fourth race at a mile and seventy yards and Gates led all the way to win easily over Wolferton.

McTaggart rode Chukles in the fifth to a well earned victory over Honey Bee, second, and Smash, third. In the sixth event he had the mount on Shalier, the favorite, and finished first at the wire with plenty to spare. Jacqueline was another of McTaggart's mounts that won when she finished first in front of O'Em and Grand in the second at a mile and seventy yards. In the third race McTaggart rode Battery, who finished second while the winner turned up in Strenuous with Star Gaze, the favorite, third. Summary:

BRADEN DIRECT SETS NEW RECORD

Four-year-old Makes Great Time in Mile Heats—New Mark Is 2:03 1-4.

Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 26.—After being second in the first heat in the King Stake for 2:06 pacers to-day, Braden Direct was turned loose and won the fastest race of turf history for a four-year-old pacer. He put the record held by himself for a single heat down to 2:04. He came back in 2:04, and finished the race with a mile in 2:04, making the fastest three heats ever raced by a pacer of his age. Braden Direct is owned by J. H. Elspass, of Denver.

For not trying in the first heat to beat Don Fronto, who was played off the boards in the heat books. Drivers Egan, Cox, and Snow were fined \$50 each. Don Fronto chased Braden Direct out in the 2:04 mile, but Braden Direct did the real contending in the other two.

Cheney, the Texas mare, a pronounced favorite, had nothing more than an easy work-out in winning the Columbus Stake away from Jack London. Carna G. was the choice for the 2:18 pace. He won the first two heats, and was in a good position for the third when a break left Addition in. The driver of Addition was changed prior to the third mile. Addition took the fourth heat, but was outpaced by Carna G. in the fifth. Summary:

LOSE FINISHES AT LOUISVILLE
