

TO ASK CITY GARBAGE PLANT.
Commissioners Again to Ask Congress for Appropriation.
A municipal garbage plant again will be asked of Congress by the Commissioners this year. Garbage is collected under the contract system. The District heads believe that the work could be

more advantageously done by the local government.
An item of \$10,000 was contained in last year's estimate for this purpose, but was stricken out on a point of order by Representative Carlin of Virginia. It is understood that a similar item is included in this year's estimate for the construction of a garbage reduction plant.
