SECURES TO HAVE THROUGH SERVICE

Vice President Ham, of Washington Railway and Electric Company, Announces Schedule Plans.

According to an announcement made yesterday by W. F. Ham, vice president of the Washington Railway and Electric Company, the residents of Somerset, Drummond, Friendship Heights, and Cleveland Park will have a through street car service to the center of the city beginning November 5. This announcement was the outcome of a conference yesterday between Mr. Ham, R. H. McLeod, John H. MacBride, and Thomas W. Smith, of the District Electric Railway Commission, and after it was made the suit brought against the company demanding such a service was dismissed. It is said that the change will mean an additional expense of between \$30,000 and \$12,000 to the company.

The schedule is explained in a letter signed yesterday by Vice President Ham and received by the Interstate Commerce Commission. It follows, in part:

"The plan calls for the operation of a fifteen-minute service between Somerset and Fifth and F Streets, leaving Somerset from 7:54 a. m. to 8:24 p. m. and leaving Fifth and F Streets from 4:55 p. m. to 11:25 p. m. During the period the half-hour service is in effect cars will be operated to Thirteenth and D Streets Northeast, via Union Station."

Vice President Ham goes on to state that through the unusual difficulty of operating such a service there may at first be some irregularity in the schedule, but promises in time to have it up to the standard.

The Rockville cars will be run to Wisconsin Avenue and M Street, and during morning rush hours south and east-bound through cars will be operated as express cars between Wisconsin Avenue and O Street and Seventeenth and H Streets.

SUIT IS DISMISSED.

Chief Justice Shepard Takes Action in Case of Joseph W. Parish.

Chief Justice Shepard of the Court of Appeals yesterday dismissed the suit brought by the late Jonas P. McGowan and Edda H. Brookshire, lawyers, in 1909, to recover \$27,728 as a contingent fee for services rendered the late Joseph W. Parish to obtain a claim against the United States for \$11,335 for ice furnished the United States during the civil war. The higher court reversed the lower court, which had held in favor of the plaintiffs. Unless the decision is appealed to the United States Supreme Court, the fund held by the bank will be payable to the estate.

In August, 1909, the claimant made a contract with the lawyers for a contingent fee for services. Miss Emily Parish, daughter of the claimant, became executrix of his will and fought the attempt of the attorneys to collect. After extended litigation an agreement was reached by which \$1,000 of the claim was deposited in a local bank to await the result of the contention, and Miss Parish received the balance of the claim.

Safety of Foreigners Assured.

The safety of foreigners and their property in the vicinity of Vera Cruz is assured, according to State Department dispatches yesterday, by the presence of 200 Federal soldiers recently arrived on the Mexican gunboat Bravo. Most of the rebels are reported to have dispersed, and some of their leaders have surrendered.

DEMOCRATS, SAYS NEWMAN.

Former National Committeeman Predicts Victory for Wilson.

Declaring political predictions that undertake to give figures and specific details a dangerous indulgence, Edward A. Newman, former Democratic national committeeman for the District, last night declined to make any forecast of the results of to-day's election other than to say he felt confident the Democratic ticket would be overwhelmingly successful.

"I feel," said Mr. Newman, "that complete political power will be given the Democratic party. Accompanying this power will be a great responsibility and a solemn obligation to redeem and fulfill the pledges of the party's platform and candidates. The temper of the people will not admit of temporizing with their political demands and economic needs."

Fine of \$5,000 Assured.

A fine of \$5,000, imposed on the Societe Anonyme des Sucreries de St. Jean, a Belgian corporation doing business in Porto Rico, for violation of the labor contract laws, was affirmed by the United States Supreme Court yesterday.


