

NO. 2226. SALONKI FALLS; 27,000 CAPTURED. Greeks March Into City After Long Draw-out Battle and Put Stop to Massacre of Christians—To Move on Gallipoli.

ENGLAND ASKED TO STOP OUTRAGES. Constantinoople, Nov. 8.—Salonki has at length been occupied by Greek troops. Their approach was attended by awful scenes.

The Greek fleet is transporting men to the left bank of the River Maritza. This move has a twofold purpose: It enables the Greeks to fall on the fortifications of the Dardanelles by landing forces at Gallipoli, and also opens for the fleet free passage to Constantinoople.

Ready to Keep Order. The plans of the commanders of the foreign warships at Constantinoople to maintain order are now complete. Their intention is to occupy the city if there is the slightest possibility of a massacre.

Tells of Horrible Cruelty of Turks. London, Nov. 8.—Appealing to his paper to "bring home to the government and the people the fact that terrible atrocities are being perpetrated daily by men in uniform calling themselves Turkish soldiers," the correspondent of the Daily Telegraph cables from Epirus, headquarters of the Greek army.

"To-day hapless refugees from Kumuzadzi—Turkish Christian subjects, be it remembered—are being tended and fed by the Greek authorities.

"Tortured women and mutilated children can be seen in Arta. I have seen them and spoken to them, and I have read with appalling sorrow what I heard their eyes. They take all the general staff officer has come in with the news that thirty more villages have been sacked and burned, and their populace subjected to torture and rapine.

"If Christendom in this land back into Turkish hands it will be an act of barbarity and a disgrace to Christendom. No words of mine can paint the horrors that are our daily agony. I beg you so to put the facts before the eyes of Great Britain that under no circumstances will this sorely tortured land be given back to those who are now rendering it a hell upon earth.

They will leave from the Philadelphia Navy Yard tomorrow, and should reach Constantinoople in about eighteen days.
