ATLANTIC COAST IN GRIP OF STORM

Telegraph Lines Down and Snow Falls in Eastern States—Gale Off Carolina.

New York, Nov. 28.—New York experienced its first of wintry weather this afternoon, when snow, accompanied by a decided drop in the temperature, came ripping up the Atlantic at a 25-mile gale. The storm was especially severe along the Virginia and Carolina coasts, but no reports of disasters to shipping have thus far been reported.

RED CROSS SOCIETY WARNS OUTSIDERS

Persons Not Connected with Organization Who Solicit Funds Are Violating Law.

According to a statement issued yesterday by the American Red Cross Society, all of the people who have been soliciting aid in the United States for the Balkan sufferers in the name of any branch of the Red Cross, except the American society, are doing so in violation of the law and are open to prosecution.

There have been several persons in this country since the start of the Turkish-Balkan war asking for contributions for the benefit of those wounded and the families of those killed in the war. One of these was Miss Slavov Grouitch, wife of the Serbian Minister to London. Mme. Grouitch made a tour of the United States and was in Washington for a short time as the guest of Miss Mabel Boardman, a member of the executive committee of the American branch, and one of the most active workers in the cause.

ARMED GUARDS AT STEEL MILLS

Trainmen in Ugly Humor Over Importation of Strike-breakers and Threaten Trouble.

Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 28.—Although the mills were closed for Thanksgiving Day, armed guards to-day were posted in the yards of the Homestead, Braddock, and Rankin steel mills, as a result of the strike of trainmen in those places. Immediate adjustment of the labor difficulties seems unlikely, persons familiar with the situation declared to-day.

DEFENDANT NEAR SCENE OF WRECK

Storekeeper Testifies to Presence of Nipper Anderson in Vicinity of Dynamited Ore Conveyor.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 28.—Testimony of Edward Cole, storekeeper of North Randall, Ohio, that he met Nipper Anderson, one of the defendants in the dynamite case, coming from the big ore conveyor that had been dynamited on March 25, 1911, causing a loss of \$60,000; the testimony of Robert G. M. Ross, who worked as a union organizer in Detroit, to the effect that Hiram Cline, the carpenter's organizer, had confided in him that there was a plot to blow up five buildings, and the announcement by United States Attorney Miller that he had received word from the Southern Surety Company that it would not surrender the indemnity that it holds for going on the bond of Pete Smith, Nipper Anderson, J. E. Munroe, H. W. Leggett, Frank K. Painter, and Phillip A. Cooley, were developments of the trial to-day.

FOUND IN GAS-FILLED ROOM.

Miss Edith Troxell, Overcome by Gas, Will Recover. Accidentally overcome by illuminating gas, Miss Edith Troxell, a clerk, fifty-five years old, was removed from her room at 47 P Street Northwest yesterday morning to Homoeopathic Hospital in a police auto from the Second and Precinct. Miss Troxell's failure to appear at breakfast led to the belief she was ill, but when a maid knocked at the door and received no answer, Abraham Kreamer, an inmate of the house, went to investigate. He forced the door and found Miss Troxell unconscious in bed. A jet was partly open, allowing a small quantity of gas to flow into the room. It is believed Miss Troxell failed to shut off the gas when she retired Wednesday night. She will recover.
