With the Washington Churches

Episcopal.

Everything points to a service of unusual importance and dignity at St. Thomas' Church this morning, when the church is to be consecrated at 10:30 o'clock.

Acceptances to attend the service have been received from over sixty clergymen, who are all expected to be in the procession. Bishop Courtney, distinguished as a great preacher, is to preach the sermon.

Order of procession and arrangements: Crossbearer; choir; deacons; priests (in order of priesthood, juniors first); visiting priests who will take part in service (in order of priesthood); curates of St. Thomas' parish; rector of St. Thomas' parish and Rev. Dr. Aspinwall, former rector; Bishop Courtney; priest attending Bishop Courtney; Canon Talbot; Bishop of Washington; chaplain of Bishop of Washington; Canon Nelms, D. D.

The procession will start on Church Street and march to the main door on Eighteenth Street. Arrived at the door, the procession will open and reverse. The Bishop, preceded by the crossbearer, will advance to the door. The crossbearer will step aside for the Bishop to kneel. After the door has been opened by the senior warden the Bishop, preceded by the crossbearer, will go up the aisle, followed by the rector and curates.

The chaplains will sit by their bishops on opposite sides of the chancel. The former clergy of the parish present—Rev. W. J. Cox, Rev. Carl E. Smith, and Rev. J. M. E. McKee—will sit immediately in front of the Bishop of Washington on the north side of the chancel. The present clergy of the parish, the rector, Rev. Dr. Potts, and Rev. C. Herbert Boese, will sit in front of Bishop Courtney on the south side of the chancel. Rev. Dr. Potts will sit at the east side of the organ console. The rear choir stall on the south side is reserved for the standing committee and senior clergy, also the four small chairs behind it. The total number of clergy provided for in the chancel is twenty-one. The remainder of the clergy will be seated in the three front pews on either side of the central aisle.

The wardens and vestrymen, drawn up in the vestibule, will fall in line behind the clergy and choir and take their seats in the row of pews immediately behind the clergy, with the senior warden next the altar and the junior warden conveniently advanced, when all are in their places, to read the instrument of donation.

At the close of the consecration service, Dr. McKee will proceed with morning prayer to the Creed (not including it). The choir will sing the Gloria at the end of each Psalm.

Dr. Potts will conclude morning prayer, beginning with the Nuncius Creed. Rev. W. J. Cox will read the first lesson.

Rev. Carl E. Smith will read the second lesson. In the Holy Communion service Canon Talbot will read the Epistle.

Rev. Dr. Aspinwall will read the Gospel. In administration of elements the Bishop's assistants will be Mr. Cox, Mr. Carl E. Smith, and Mr. McKee.

The procession will return the way it came and in the order in which it was originally drawn up in the parish hall, the wardens and vestrymen following in the rear. In returning it will be necessary for the clergy in the chancel to pause for a moment at the foot of the chancel steps in order that the deacons and visiting clergy in the pews may fall in line behind the choir.

Through the influence and steady efforts of Mrs. Harbourn Walker and the many missionary speakers to whom she has given opportunity to address the girls of the National Cathedral School, there has been a rapidly increasing interest and effort on behalf of the missionary work of the church in the school during the last four or five years. An active missionary society has been admirably organized for some length of

time and the meetings every Sunday night are extremely interesting. Several years ago the secretary of the school, Miss Margaret H. Hadley, caught the spirit and is now a woman missionary in China.

To Mrs. Harbourn Walker herself the call has now come and she has resigned her position as principal of the school to take charge of a new school for girls in Manila. This is not intended for the natives, but for the daughters of American residents in the Philippines in the service of the government or in private business. It will supply a long-felt need for the proper training of our American young people living in the Far East, will prevent much breaking up of the family now caused by sending girls home for school, and will fulfill an earnest hope and endeavor of Bishop Brent.

Mrs. Walker leaves the National Cathedral School for Girls July 1 and immediately proceeds to Manila. She will be accompanied by one of the graduates of the school, who has taught in the school for several years, and by two other accomplished young women, who assist her in her new undertaking for Christ and His church.

The chapter of Washington Cathedral, as trustee of the National Cathedral School, has named resolutions of regret at Mrs. Walker's departure, warmly commending her work, and bidding her Godspeed in her new venture.

The rector, vestry, and building committee of St. Alban's parish issued invitations to the service of dedication of the Memorial Guild Hall for 8 p. m. Thursday last. There was a reception in the Guild Hall after the service.

Rev. Dr. Bratenahl, secretary of the Third Missionary Department, is making a visitation of all the dioceses and many of the parishes which are in his department. His headquarters are in Washington. He is visiting some of the parishes in this diocese, and to-morrow he is to be at Emmanuel, Anacostia.

The Washington clerical met at the Highlands at 1 p. m. on Tuesday last. After the usual luncheon, the clerics came together for business, which included the election of officers. It being the annual meeting, the venerable Archdeacon Williams was unanimously elected to succeed Dr. Bratenahl, the retiring president. Rev. Canon G. F. Dunlop was elected to succeed himself as secretary, an honor he has deservedly enjoyed for many years past. The president is elected annually.

The appointed speaker was Rev. Dr. C. Ernest Smith, who spoke on the subject, "How the Church May Be Made More Effective."

The discussion, which followed, was held in by Dr. Williams, Canon Canon Howden, Rev. C. Abbott, Jr., and others.

Rev. E. S. Dunlop introduced a resolution relative to combating the social evil, particularly strengthening the hands of those fighting in his stronghold. Dr. Herbert Scott Smith, Rev. T. A. Johnson, rector of Laurel, and others spoke on the subject.

Efforts are being made to put the Church Periodical Club on a stronger foundation, so as to extend its admirable work. The Bishop writes approvingly concerning these efforts.

It gives me pleasure to endorse the work of the Church Periodical Club to endeavor to increase its endowment fund and to associate this ambition with the commemoration of its twenty-fifth anniversary on the 19th of this coming January. This society in a quiet way has done and is doing a most valuable work for the clergy in providing them with helpful reading matter, which otherwise could not obtain, and has brought all this cheer to the clergy at a marvellously small expenditure. I do earnestly hope that it will be successful in providing a fund sufficient to cover the small expenses of administration of the central office.

The regular meeting of the Sunday School Institute was held last Tuesday

at 7:30 p. m. It had a very full program, no less than four different subjects being dealt with. 1. "The Holy Nativity and its Practical Lessons for Children," by the Rev. Herbert Scott Smith, D. D., rector of St. Margaret's Parish, 2. "The Sunday School Offering," by Rev. Canon Dunlop, rector of St. Stephen's Parish, 3. "Report of the Sunday School Workers' Conference for Montgomery County," by Mr. W. R. Dent, Chaplain of the Redeemer, Glen Echo, 4. "The Sunday School Advent Offering," by Venerable Archdeacon Williams.

The usual Epiphany missionary rallies will be held at the Church of the Epiphany, St. Mark's Church, and Christ's Church, Georgetown, Sunday, January 12.

Rev. Canon Nelms, D. D., who has been quite sick the last few days, is now sufficiently recovered to conduct the usual services and preach next Sunday.

At 4 p. m. to-morrow the cantata, "The Story of Bethlehem," by John E. West, will be sung at the Bethlehem Chapel of the Nativity.

A Christmas Eve there will be a mid-night celebration of the Holy Communion in the chapel. In connection with this service it has been arranged that special cars leave Mount St. Alban's for the city at 12:30 and 1:15 a. m.

Presbyterian.

Rev. Dr. Thomas C. Clark preached the sermon at the installation of the Rev. Alfred E. Barrows as pastor of the Eastern Presbyterian Church last Tuesday evening. The services were held at the Eastern Church. Rev. Paul R. Hickok delivered the charge to the pastor and Rev. Dr. Charles Wood gave the charge to the people. Both outlined the duties and responsibilities of the pastor and the congregation.

Rev. Mr. Hickok declared that the great mass of influence which Rev. Barrows could exert would be through personal influence distributed through the week days. "You are an official," he said, "but most of all you are a friend." He said that a pastor should emulate his teachings by the life he led. His life, asserted the speaker, would be more prominent than his teachings.

The announcements of the action of the presbytery in approving the choice of Rev. Barrows as pastor of the church, and the proposing of the constitutional questions were conducted by Rev. James T. Marshall, the moderator. Rev. James M. Nourse read the scripture lesson. The invocation prayer was offered by Rev. Dr. George M. Cummins. Rev. Dr. E. Davis gave the invocation and the newly installed pastor, Rev. Barrows, pronounced the benediction.

Rev. E. G. Magert, of Harrington, Del., has accepted a call to the pastorate of the Chesapeake City, Md., Presbyterian Church.

Rev. James Kelley Argo, who recently closed his pastorate in the Old First Church of the Washington City Presbyterian Church at Hyattsville, has received calls to two churches in Western Pennsylvania.

Mr. Argo will visit the churches during the holidays and take the calls under consideration.

The Hyattsville Church is still vacant and the congregation is an attractive suburb of Washington makes it an attractive field of labor, and there will be many applicants for the church. This is really the oldest Presbyterian church in America, and dates its beginning back to the ministry of Rev. Matthew Hill, who began his work down on the Patuxent River in the year 1668. This church has the oldest communion service in the Presbyterian Church in America, and was donated by Queen Anne in the year 1707. Since Mr. Argo became pastor this old service has been supplanted by the individual cups. This ancient communion service will soon be placed as a loan

with the Presbyterian Historical Society of Philadelphia, and will be the oldest and most valuable in the collection of the society.

Methodist.

Special Christmas services will take place at Metropolitan Church Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, with sermon by the pastor, At 8 o'clock Dr. Montgomery will speak on the subject "The Star of Jesse."

An elaborate Christmas choral service will be held to-morrow evening at 8 o'clock in Hamilton Methodist Episcopal Church, Ninth and P Streets Northwest. The music will be given by a chorus, consisting of the regular church quartet, assisted by a number of additional singers.

Special Christmas music will also be sung at the morning service, commencing at 10 o'clock. The subject of the sermon by the pastor, Rev. Joseph M. Gray, at 11 o'clock, will be "The Priesthood of Christ."

The Epworth League will hold a Christmas service at 7 o'clock to-morrow evening. E. S. Barrows, general superintendent of the Sunday school, will be the speaker. His subject will be "Prophesy, Fully Revealed, the Highest Expression of Truth."

The subject of Dr. Waddlespoon's sermon to-morrow morning in Foundry Methodist Episcopal Church is "The Christian Joy," and at the evening service the subject is "How to Live a Man Full of God." Illustrated by Ben-Hur. On Monday evening the annual Christmas entertainment will be held. The Christmas cantata, "The Heart of the Belia," will be rendered by members of the Sunday school. On Christmas morning at 10 o'clock there will be a praise and prayer service, to continue for one-half hour.

The large church choir under the direction of Prof. Joseph Harrison will render special music at both the services on Sunday at the Ninth Street Christian Church, Ninth and D Streets Northwest. The pastor, Rev. George A. Miller, will preach in the morning on "The Christmas Message," and in the evening on "Blessed Be the Mother." The Christmas exercises of the Sunday school will be held at 10 o'clock there will be a praise and prayer service, to continue for one-half hour.

Evangelist Henry F. Lutz will preach at the H Street Church, H Street near Fourth and one-half Street, Southwest, at 11 a. m. and 7:30 p. m.

Lutheran.

At the Epiphany Lutheran Church, Sixth and D Streets Northwest, on Sunday morning the pastor, Rev. A. F. Steck, D. The choir of forty voices will sing at the 11 o'clock morning service the following anthems: "And the Glory of the Lord," from the "Messiah," "Gloria in Excelsis" from (Gounod); "Hosanna Solenne"; "Praise Ye the Lord" (Randelgraber); and "Hallelujah," from the "Messiah."

Sunday evening there will be at Fifth Baptist Church a most unique Christmas service of "Sermon, Chorus and Story," with musical settings based on "The Shepherd's Story," adapted from "The Cross Triumphant," by Florence Morse Kingsley, with music by Grant Colfax, Turner, and Meredith. Father Meagher, who has been ill during the past three months, has recently returned from a trip in the South, where he spent a few days in regaining his strength.
