LATEST! ALUMINUM HATS. Boston Man Would Make Such Headgear Compulsory.

Boston, Jan. 19.—Aluminum hats as a solution of the high cost of hats are advocated by John P. Benson, Boston writer and publisher. He says they would save \$200,000,000 every year in this country and shatter the high cost of living.

He proposes to introduce a bill making compulsory the wearing of aluminum hats, which would be supplied without charge by the State to every young woman when she attains the age of military indorsement.

The hats, says Mr. Benson, would be durable, artistic, and inexpensive. With a simple turn of the wrist they could be bent into the shape prescribed by the latest dictates of fashion.

They would be warm and light and would last a lifetime. The statute he proposes would permit the owner to paint her hat any color she fancied, and to tack on any simple trimming that appealed to her individual taste.
