MOTOR OWNERS AGAIN ORGANIZE

New Association Is Formed at Meeting Held at the Raleigh Hotel.

MILLS IS PRESIDENT

Club Headquarters Are Donated by Young and Simon in New York Avenue.

The Washington Motorists' Association, an outgrowth of the old Automobile Club, was organized last night at a meeting of fifty prominent motorists of the District at the Raleigh. The membership of the new organization is open not only to automobile owners, but to drivers, dealers and any one interested in automobiles. Its objects are to bring into closer relationship all motorists of the District, to advocate and promote safe and sane legislation, and to work for the repeal or amendment of all laws and regulations considered unfair, unnecessary and unduly oppressive.

An attorney will be retained by the association to defend the members against unlawful arrest and to assist them of the automobile laws of the nearby States.

The question of affiliation with the American Automobile Association was informally discussed. There developed some unexpected opposition to the movement, but the general opinion seemed to be that the association would eventually affiliate with the parent body.

Harrington Mills President. A. G. Hatchelder, chairman of the executive committee of the American Automobile Association, conferred with John K. Heyl, regarding the movement. Mr. Hatchelder stated that his organization would establish its headquarters in this city in the near future. The second annual convention of the organization will be held in Washington March 5 to 7.

The constitution and by-laws, as framed by the committee, were unanimously adopted. The question of the apportionment of the dues to pay expenses and the officers' salaries was left to the discretion of the board of directors. Morris Simon, of the real estate firm of Young & Simon, donated to the new club the use of rooms in their building in New York Avenue.

Harrington Mills was elected president; W. W. Chiswell, vice president; John K. Heyl, secretary and treasurer, and D. McEntire, attorney. The following were elected to serve on the board of directors: Joseph W. Stoddard, W. C. Long, W. D. West, Claude Miller, and C. E. Bell.

SUNSHINE CLUB MEETS

Miss Alberta Burns Delivers Lecture on Suffrage Movement.

The Washington Sunshine Club listened to a discourse on woman suffrage at its meeting yesterday afternoon in the assembly hall of the New Raleigh from Miss Alberta Burns, of London.

Miss Burns gave a brief outline of how the suffrage campaign was organized in England and urged that women of the United States organize themselves and work more in unison for their common end.

E. S. Martin, District Superintendent of Playgrounds, gave a brief talk on how the District is providing for its children in the way of open-air play places. He had several children at the meeting to demonstrate certain games they had been taught. Mrs. Fred T. Duhols gave a short talk on the "big brother" movement.

Texas to Form Society. Natives of Texas residing in Washington will hold a meeting to-night at the Pythian Temple, 1012 Ninth Street Northwest, to organize a Texas Society. A large number of notification cards have been sent to Texans in Washington. An interesting programme has been prepared, including short talks by several members of Congress and government officials. The organization will be nonpolitical in character.

DARNEILLE ON STAND IN INSURANCE PROBE

Appraiser Says \$2,000,000 Valuation on Southern Building Was Compromise from Original Figure.

That Charles F. Carust informed him that his valuation of \$2,000,000 on the Southern Building property was too high and that the final valuation placed upon the property of \$1,000,000 involved a compromise between conflicting estimates of \$2 and \$60 as the square foot value of the land was part of the testimony of Hopewell H. Darnelle at the insurance investigation yesterday.

Mr. Darnelle was one of three appraisers appointed to re-appraise the property at the request of the insurance companies, the new owners, his testimony that at the time of the appraisal he did not know that the two insurance companies were in existence or that they owned the building. When he received the statement from Mr. Carust, he said, he was under the impression that the latter was president of the Southern Building Corporation. He said the appraisers in their judgment of the value of the property were not affected by the statement as to the earning capacity of the building received from Mr. Carust.

CITIZENS' ASSOCIATION OBSERVES ANNIVERSARY

Brightwood Park Organization Sixteen Years Old—Members Enjoy Musical and Literary Programme.

The Brightwood Park Citizens' Association last night celebrated the sixteenth anniversary of its organization with a musical, literary, and social programme that was enjoyed by a large gathering.

D. A. Edwards, president of the Federation of Citizens' Associations, was the guest of the evening and talked interestingly of the British invasion of Washington in 1914.

The programme consisted of an overture by the orchestra, songs by Fred Lockman, Miss Washington, and Master Samuel Moore, recitations by Alfred Roderick and Miss Helen Freas, instrumental solos by E. Kerrigan, mandolin, and James Davis, concert vocal selections by the Olympic Quartet. Dancing followed the regular programme.

PRaises BOARD OF TRADE.

F. L. Olmsted Commends Work in Interest of Park Plans.

Frederick Law Olmsted, of Brookline, Mass., only surviving member of the Park Commission, has commended the Washington Board of Trade for its activity in creating public sentiment favorable to the commission's plans for the development of Washington.

In a telegram to Arthur C. Mosek, chairman of the Board's special park commission committee, Mr. Olmsted says: "I would urge attention to the two-fold nature of park requirements in Washington: First, the orderly, dignified, and beautiful development both of open spaces and of public structures, as they shall be required to provide in an adequate manner for the increasing volume of the nation's governmental business."

Second, the creation and maintenance of those local recreation grounds, outlying parks, and connecting parkways which are requisite to the welfare of the inhabitants of every city.

The Park Commission was composed of Mr. Olmsted, Augustus St. Gaudens, Daniel H. Burnham, and Charles F. McKim.
