DOUBLE SLAYER HANGED IN JAIL

Samuel W. Rauen, Who Shot Brother and Wife, Pays Death Penalty.

NERVY TO THE END

Spiritual Adviser Takes Charge of Body and Has It Buried.

The first execution at the United States jail in four years took place yesterday morning shortly after 10 o'clock, when Samuel W. Rauen, former soldier, paid the penalty on the gallows for the murder of his wife and brother.

Fearedly, and with a prayer on his lips, Rauen went to his death. Before the execution, he asserted in a statement to newspaper reporters that he had been convicted on perjured evidence, and that he considered his crime a justifiable homicide in view of the circumstances preceding it.

"I want to tell the public that I am not guilty of murder," Rauen said, "and that I was convicted on perjured testimony."

"Had I been given an opportunity to prove what I knew and what my witnesses knew, the government would never have been able to prove me guilty of murder."

"If my attorneys had been satisfied and I had been given one chance in a hundred—but I was not given that chance—things would have been different."

"I consider this a justifiable homicide on circumstances proven and on the impulse of the moment."

Rauen had a walk of fully half a block from his cell to the condemned row, in the south wing, to the gallows, erected in the extreme north wing. This procedure was a new departure, prisoners formerly having stepped direct from the death cell door to the gallows platform.

The former soldier walked the entire distance between two guards with a firm step. He displayed no nervousness, and on leaving a small red cap, given by the other prisoners in the same row with him. He was accompanied by Rev. Father Michael Gallagher, his spiritual adviser.

Within half a minute of the time he stepped on the platform the drop had been sprung. Ten minutes later physicians pronounced the man dead.

Last Night a Restful One. Rauen displayed little nervousness during the night, and slept soundly for several hours. He had retained his appetite throughout, and yesterday morning ate a hearty breakfast of ham and eggs, tomatoes, griddle cakes, and coffee. He was served a double portion, and gave half of it to Tony Milano, who was in the next cell, and who is condemned to die March 14 for the murder of a ten-year-old boy.

Father Gallagher was with Rauen during the greater part of the night. The soldier bade farewell to Milano and Sabers, another soldier, also condemned to death, who were in cells adjoining his. He cried his farewells to the others and bid good-by to Warden Zinkhan and the deputies with whom he had come in contact during his incarceration.

Rauen had several relatives in Chicago, but none claimed the body. The body remained hanging until 11 o'clock, when it was taken down and interred in Mount Olivet Cemetery, at the direction of Rev. Father Gallagher. The latter performed last rites for the church.

Rauen was convicted early in January and sentenced to hang January 21. He was granted a week's reprieve by President Taft. He was found guilty of the murder of his wife, Cecelia Jones Rauen, and his brother, John Rauen, on March 1912. Rauen shot the two while in front of his wife's home, 102 Seventh Street Southwest.
