COLTON FUNERAL TO-DAY.

Old Railroad Official Will Be Interred in Rock Creek Cemetery.

Funeral services for Francis Colton, father of Gov. George E. Colton of Porto Rico, and a former officer of the Union Pacific Railroad, will be held at 4 o'clock this afternoon from the residence, 1633 Connecticut Avenue. Rev. Roland Colton-Smith, of St. John's Church, will officiate. Interment will be in Rock Creek Cemetery.

He is survived by Gov. Colton and two daughters, Mrs. Archibald Davis, wife of Commander Davis, U. S. N., and Miss Marjorie Colton.

In 1888 Mr. Colton was appointed United States Consul at Venice, Italy, to succeed William Dean Howells. He remained in that post for several years, during the period embraced by the unification of Italy.

Upon his return to this country, in 1892, he became one of the general officers of the Union Pacific Railroad Company.

His most notable achievement in the railroad world occurred in the '70's, when he made a tour of the world, as president of the Union Pacific and succeeded in turning to this country, by way of the Pacific, the tea trade which had formerly come from the Orient by the East India Company.

He retired from active business, he had made Washington his home for a number of years. He was an active member of the Metropolitan and Chevy Chase Clubs, where he spent much of his time. Mrs. Colton died in 1901.

The Colton residence on Connecticut Avenue has been the scene of many brilliant social functions, his daughter, Miss Marjorie Colton, acting as hostess.
