VICE IS CAUSED BY LONG HOURS

Wages Do Not Control Morals of Women Workers, Says Social Worker.

CONSUMERS HEAR TALK
Miss Frances Perkins, of New York, Interests Audience by Describing Conditions.

That long hours play a more important part than low wages in the moral delinquencies of employed girls and women, due to the fact that they have no time for normal pleasure, was the statement made yesterday at Raucher's by Miss Frances Perkins, of New York, at the second annual meeting of the Consumers' League of the District.

"People have said that the economic situation is responsible for vice conditions in this country," said Miss Perkins, "but they have forgotten that long hours play a large part in the situation. The minimum wage agitation has started a movement for better conditions. It, however, has lost sight of the fact that conditions are mainly due to long hours.

"Employment at monotonous work for long hours results in an abnormal condition, and causes moral weakening. When girls employed at such work and under such conditions become worn out and fatigued they are sometimes guilty of moral transgressions that they would never sanction if healthy and rested.

"Moral defenses are weakened when a person is tired. It is amazing that the slightest temptation will cause girls who work from ten to twelve hours a day, often seven days a week, to slip into superficial pleasures of which they would not even think in normal circumstances.

Fun Is Necessary.
"It is the right of youth to have fun; and youth will have fun. Americans do not realize the necessity of fun if we are to be a happy, healthy nation. Fun has a definite relation to the moral happiness and health of the country. Long hours cause a physical downfall that is as bad as a possible moral downfall.

"The health and general wealth of the community, not profits, are most essential in industry. It is too late to stop employment of women, as women always have done certain kinds of work, but the changing conditions forcing women into factories, whereas they formerly worked at home, should be adapted to the women—not women to machines.

"Every half hour of lost energy, of broken health, is paid for by succeeding generations in devitalization. We do not realize the extent to which girls are broken down by long hours and the lack, therefore, of normal, healthy fun, which is essential to their lives.

Mrs. Wiley Is Re-elected.
Officers of the league were elected as follows: Mrs. H. W. Wiley, president; Miss Constance D. Leupp, vice president; Mrs. W. G. Stuart, recording secretary; Miss Marion Fallow, corresponding secretary, and William D. Hoover, treasurer.

Mrs. Wiley reported conditions in the league. She detailed the work of the league in working for an eight-hour law in the District, and said she expected it to be passed this session of Congress. The bill already has passed the Senate.

She said that the league had been successful in persuading proprietors of two large Washington department stores to close their establishments at the same time on Saturdays as on other days of the week.

Furniture Company Loses.
The suit of C. H. Rexford, of North Carolina, to declare void deeds to several thousand acres of timber land in that State, held by the Brunswick-Balke-Comoler Company, was decided in favor of the former yesterday by the Supreme Court of the United States, on jurisdictional grounds and the case remanded for further proceedings.

Mrs. John P. Hawkins Is Dead.
Mrs. John P. Hawkins, of this city, died in Indianapolis Sunday morning. She was the wife of Brig. Gen. John P. Hawkins, former commissary general of the army. Her father, Col. Craig, was chief of ordnance of the army at the beginning of the civil war.

JUNK TURNED TO GOLD.

Waste Copper Saves Navy Department \$50,000.

The means of effecting an economy of \$50,000 at one whack was discovered at the Navy Department yesterday by Assistant Secretary Franklin D. Roosevelt and Paymaster General Cowie.

The saving will be made out of the junk pile at the New York Navy Yard. Several months ago, the department decided to sort out the scrap metal at the various navy yards and save what was valuable, instead of giving it to junk dealers at a few cents a pound. A vast amount of copper was found, and so it was decided, as an experiment, to install a metal reducing plant at the New York yard to melt up the copper.

Yesterday a requisition came through calling for 300,000 pounds of copper, to cost \$50,000. The department was about to spend the money, when Admiral Cowie thought he would see if the New York yard had not accumulated enough copper to help out on this large order. The yard officials replied over the phone that they could deliver at once 300,000 pounds of the copper, and 100,000 pounds more if it was necessary.

The requisition for the purchase of the order of copper in the market was torn up, and it has been decided that a similar reduction plant will be installed at the Norfolk Navy Yard.

VETERINARIANS TO GRADUATE.

United States School Tonight Will Give Diplomas to 27 Students.

The nineteenth annual commencement of the United States College of Veterinary Surgeons will be held tonight at Old Fellows' Hall. A class of twenty-seven students will be graduated. The principal speaker will be Representative T. W. Sisson, of Mississippi.

Rev. J. S. Montgomery, of the Metropolitan M. E. Church, will deliver the prayer. Degrees will be conferred by George A. Prevost, LL. B. Addresses to graduates will be given by the dean, B. T. Woodward, V. M. D. A musical programme will be furnished by a section of the Marine Band.
