

**U. S. WINS BIG TRACT FROM RAILWAY COMPANY**

Western Judge Orders Property Worth \$30,000,000 Forfeited to the Federal Government.

Portland, Ore., April 29.—The court orders that a decree be entered forfeiting those lands to the United States government and that government recovers its cost and disbursements in this case.

By this statement of Judge C. E. Wolverton, of the Federal District Court today, land stipulated to be worth \$30,000,000 and estimated by experts to have a value of \$40,000,000 to \$50,000,000 was taken from the Southern Pacific Company and returned to the Federal government.

Judge Wolverton's decision ends in the lower courts the greatest land case the Federal government has yet prosecuted. Land aggregating slightly more than 2,300,000 acres for which the people of Oregon have been clamoring insistently the past decade, was declared the property of the Federal government to be opened for settlement or purchase by the people, if Congress so desires.

**KILBANE AND DUNDEE FIGHT CALLED DRAW**

Two Feather-weights Engage in Battle that is Interesting Only in Spots.

Los Angeles, April 29.—Referee Riton declared the twenty-round bout between Johnny Kilbane and Johnny Dundee tonight a draw. This, it is to be presumed, means one-half the feather-weight championship will remain in Cleveland, and the other half go to New York to keep company with America's cup. The bout between the two Johnnies was interesting in spots only. If they had used their hands half as much as they used their feet, it is just possible that a knock-down blow would have been in evidence at some time during the evening.

Kilbane is all that has been claimed for him in the line of cleverness. But judging tonight's work, heavy punching is his specialty. There is this much to be said, of course. In Dundee he met one of the shiftest youngsters ever seen in the ring. Dundee may not be a good judge of distance, but he seems to know his dot when anything dangerous is coming his way. By drawing back at the right moment he converted probably a half hundred right crosses into misses and half that number into glancing blows.

Kilbane's palpable object in first to last was to end it all with a right snip. He feinted his opponent into leaving openings, and whenever the moment seemed opportune, John's dexterous glove shot across like a flash. But quick as a cat, the little New Yorker was equally quick in dodging, and although Kilbane tried repeatedly, the number of rights he landed could probably be counted on the fingers of one hand. Among them all there was only one solid enough and well timed enough to send Dundee back a pace and that was delivered very late in the fight.

**CAPITAL SUFFRAGISTS IN NEW YORK PARADE**

Washington Delegation to March Immediately Behind National Officers in Line.

While the reports of preparations for the big suffrage parade and pageant to be held in New York on Friday and Saturday of this week are emphasizing the fact that many New York beauties are to form a "beauty section," it has leaked out that special efforts have been made to induce the young and beautiful suffragists of the Capital to join the delegation from this city, which will leave for New York Friday noon. The list of those who will make the trip, given out some days ago, shows that the plan has been successful.

That the delegation will be a creditable one for Washington is an assured fact, for scores of names are being added to the list daily. The party will be given a position of honor immediately behind the small group constituting the National Board of the American National Woman's Suffrage Association, which will head the parade on Saturday. The Washington delegation will thus be the first body representing a local organization in the line of march. The members will carry the banner of the Congressional committee of the association.

Mrs. Charles Owens was selected yesterday to act as marshal of the District of Columbia delegation. Final arrangements bearing on the details of the trip will be made and instructions issued to those making up the party at a meeting to be held in the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce at 8 o'clock Thursday evening. Mrs. Olive Haskbrook will conduct a suffrage meeting immediately after the transaction of business.

The special train carrying the Washington delegation will leave Union Station at noon Friday, and will get to New York in time for the pageant, which is to be held that night in the Metropolitan Opera House. The speech of former President Roosevelt will immediately precede it. Returning, the special train will reach Washington Sunday evening.

**POPE OUT OF DANGER.**

For First Time Since Illness Takes Solid Food.

Rome, April 29.—Pope Pius continued to improve in health today. He partook of solid food for the first time in many days and appeared to relish the small amount which he was allowed. During almost the entire day the Pontiff sat in his armchair by one of the large windows in his chamber.

Prof. Marchisava said today that he considered the Holy Father removed from all imminent danger, and has decided to visit the Vatican but once a day henceforth. Dr. Amiel, however, will remain in constant attendance upon the Pope. This measure is being taken to insure a strict obedience of the physician's instructions regarding the amount of rest which the Pontiff must take each day. If the Pope continues the improvement, he will be allowed to leave his bedchamber early next week.

**AUTOS IN COLLISION.**

Senator Lippitt's Machine Runs Into a Lamp-post.

Raron von Lersner, secretary of the German Embassy, and Capt. Little, U. S. M. C., were badly shaken up last night when the automobile of Senator Lippitt of Rhode Island, in which they were riding, collided with another motor at Seventeenth and M Streets Northwest, and skidded into a lamp-post. Both cars were badly damaged.

Senator Lippitt was not in his auto mobile at the time of the accident. The machine, which was driven by James Linley, chauffeur for the senator, hit with such force as to break the lamp-post.

**CONCESSION FOR MILITANT.**

Mrs. Pankhurst Granted Extension of Leave Because Ill.

London, April 29.—Because of her physical condition, Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, president of the Women's Social and Political Union, who was temporarily released from Holloway Jail April 12 because of illness brought on by a hunger strike, was granted an extension of leave today by the Home Office.

Doctors representing the government examined Mrs. Pankhurst, and reported that she was not in fit condition to resume serving her three years' sentence.

**SEVERE QUAKE PROPHESED.**

University Professor Says Country is to Feel Disturbance.

Watertown, N. Y., April 29.—A St. Lawrence University professor, who is a reputed earthquake authority, says the shock felt through the St. Lawrence region Monday night is only a forerunner of a more serious and disastrous quake that will occur soon along the Logan Fault.

This coming shock, he says, will extend from the St. Lawrence Valley along the Atlantic coast to Alabama, and will be accompanied by great seismicographic disturbances. Monday's shock, declares this authority, was the most serious since the great quake in 1882.

No records of earthquakes in Northern New York State and Canada, reported to have occurred last night, appeared upon the seismographic charts of the Georgetown College Observatory here yesterday, according to Father Torndorf, astronomer in charge of the observatory.

**BALTIMORE MAN A SUICIDE.**

Frederick N. McDonald, Prominent Sportsman, Kills Self.

Baltimore, Md., April 29.—Frederick N. McDonald, prominent sportsman, president of the F. N. McDonald Company, wholesale paper dealers and secretary of the Baltimore and Southern Paper Trade Association, committed suicide at his home here today.

Determination marked the efforts of Mr. McDonald to make sure of death. He fired one shot behind the right ear, and then sent a second bullet into his heart. Mr. McDonald had been suffering from locomotor ataxia for some years, and members of his family say this was the cause for his act.

Reports received here stated that the Federals were in retreat toward Cuernavaca and that they were in danger of being annihilated.

**LUMBER COMPANY SUED.**

Thomas R. Riley Company Made Defendant by Ormsby McHarg.

Ormsby McHarg, a New York lawyer, former Assistant Secretary of Commerce and Labor, yesterday filed suit against the Thomas R. Riley Lumber Company and Thomas R. Riley, individually, for \$25,000 damages for alleged breach of contract.

Plaintiff avers that February 26 last defendants represented to him that the corporation owned 20,000 acres of timber land in North Carolina on which they wished to negotiate a loan of \$500,000, payable in ten years, in the form of 6 per cent bonds. Plaintiff was to arrange the matter and negotiate the sale of the bonds, and was to receive \$2,000 in cash for his services and two notes of \$10,000 each, payable in one and two years. Plaintiff alleges that he made arrangements with a responsible banking firm to finance the undertaking providing the representations of the defendants were true.

Mr. McHarg alleges that neither of the defendants had a good fee simple title to the land and the negotiations failed through no fault of his. He said when he made demand April 19 for compensation he was refused.
