New York, May 31.—A hitch has occurred in the \$75,000,000 Mexican loan being arranged by foreign bankers and participated in by J. P. Morgan & Co. and Kuhn, Loeb & Co. It was reported unofficially in Wall Street this afternoon that the hitch was due to the refusal of the United States to recognize the Huerta administration in Mexico, but nothing definite came from Paris, the center of the loan negotiations.

The general morale and efficiency of the postal service was sacrificed to a ruthlessly enforced policy of false economy for the sole purpose of presenting a showing of self-maintenance; and after the attainment of this end, just before the inauguration of the new administration, the policy was reversed.

TRAC COST OF SERVICE
