

GROOM IN FORM AND BROWNIES ARE BEATEN

Nationals On Top; Groom Fans Twelve

Browns Go Down in Opening Game of Series—Errors Aid in Run Hunt.

FINAL COUNT IS 3 TO 2

After handing the Browns two runs on a silver platter, the gang from St. Louis yesterday turned right around and presented Washington with the opening game of the series. Score, 3 to 2.

Bob Groom and Earl Hamilton engaged in a lively pitching tilt, and Sir Robert emerged on top, allowing seven hits and striking out twelve—the best exhibition of laying opposing sluggers low via the whiff route any Washington twirler has shown this season.

The game itself, witnessed by a small crowd, was interesting in spite of the ragged play at critical stages by both sides.

Catcher Sam Agnew had a bad day, while Pitcher Hamilton can blame only himself for his defeat. It was Agnew's passed ball that gave the Nationals a chance to knot the count in the sixth, and Hamilton's wild pitch in the seventh that permitted the winning marker to count.

Bob Groom's masterly pitching, sensational stops and catches by Walsh and Johnston, together with the hitting of Clyde Milan, three blows out of four times up, were the noteworthy features of the combat.

Groom in Rare Form.

The Browns threatened trouble during five innings out of the nine, but with the exception of the fourth Bob Groom had them laughing to the mast. Sir Robert resorted entirely to a "spitter" and his wide sweeping curve.

Manager George Stovall sent young brief to cover first base and watched him get so close to the bag that the umpire called him out on a balk.

In disposing of Hamilton the Climbars have played on the shelf the best infielder in the Stovall stable, and in consequence there is much rejoicing in the Griff camp.

Hattered and crippled as they are the Climbars put up a first class snappy game, except in one instance, when a couple of errors were lumped the same number of hits.

There was not a whole lot of hitting strength in evidence, but when Young Hamilton is at his best none of the clubs in the National circuit bother him a whole lot, and Hamilton looked mighty good yesterday.

In the only inning Milan failed to hit the ball safely, the third, he missed a chance to send over two runs, for Moeller was on third base and Schaefer held down second at the time with two down, and Clyde Perkins had taken a brief.

The Browns broke the setting of goose egg innings by sending over a couple of shutouts in the fourth.

Bert Shotten started the trouble by walking a strike to center field. Jack Johnston laid down a bunt to see if Frank Laporte had a good enough whiff to get the ball over to first. Frank demonstrated to the satisfaction of all concerned that his arm is still powerful, and he heaved the sphere into the stands, and before Hippo Williams could recover it Shotten had scored and Johnston was on the keystone sack.

John Henry's Amherst tactics won him a base on balls in the fifth.

According to Tom de Sousa McBride hit the ball in front of the plate, but he attempted to get Williams' grass cutter in the sixth session.

In the play between bases when Johnston made a flying dive to interrupt Laporte's left gardener was soundly smacked with the ball when he ran out of line by a swift pass from Laporte.

Agnew's gunner-bun toddle after Schaefer's "tow" fly back was of no effect, as the ball trickled through his padded fingers and the crowd chuckled.

Walsh is a "footy" lad, but Bob Groom kept him on the bases quite the same as he had kept his young offspring in the straddle and tethered to apron strings.

Injurious to score on a passed ball, but McBride proved to be above it. The Browns, chamelon-like, have changed their color to light gray and black.

Carl Cashion may never pitch another baseball game.

The big lad from Carolina, who last year won eleven games out of seventeen, and who up until recently has been considered the most promising youngster in the American League, may have to quit the game for good and ever.

It was in Cleveland last month that Cashion wrenched a muscle loose in the region of his right elbow. Since then he has been treated by physicians, but with no signs of improvement.

During morning practice yesterday Cashion worked out, but could get little on the ball, and his arm pained him so that he was forced to stop.

A consultation was held last night between the club physician and other experts as to what could be done for the big fellow. The result of this conference is not known.

Cashion's case is a puzzling one and it is rumored that his pitching days are over.

The Carolina Curver has youth on his side and it is, of course, possible that he may eventually regain the use of his pitching arm, but those who are familiar with his case are far from optimistic.

It is interesting to note that today is Cashion's twenty-fourth birthday.

Scout Mike Kahoe dug up the big chap during the summer of 1911 and the Washington club purchased his release from the Greenville club of the Carolina Association.

Cashion broke into the league against the Chicago White Sox, pitching the second game of a double header. He won it by a comfortable margin, and from that time until the present has been regarded by a great baseball men as the makings of a great pitcher.

Manager Griffith would have played Jacinto Calve in the outfield during yesterday's game, but Cashion worked a right-hand pitcher. In fact, he decided to give the young Cuban a chance, and would have gone through with it but for the reason that Hamilton warmed up, and as the Nationals are not especially fortified with heavy hitters, owing to their present crippled condition, he changed his mind at the last minute and sent Al Williams out to right field.

Washington fans are anxious to see what Calve can do in a championship game, and Griff will give the youngster a chance, probably, before the series against the Browns is finished.

Joe Engel will likely start today's game against the Browns, and opposed to the youngster will be either Lefty Levern or Carl Weiland.

Eddie Almsmith drew a suspension from President Ben Johnson for his actions during Monday's game, when he made a bad throw, a handful of us in the direction of Umpire Bill O'Loughlin after Slik had called him out on a close decision.

Clyde Milan seems to have hit his stride at last. Against Hamilton, a left-hand pitcher, yesterday the Tennessee Flyer connected for three safe hits out of four times up.

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
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STOVALL SAYS McBRIDE IS ONE OF GAME'S GREATEST PLAYERS
