FIFTY MILK MEN MAY BE FIRED

Violation of Pure Food Laws Is Charge Against Dealers.

GUILTY PLEAS EXPECTED

Prosecution Is Aftermath of Decision of Court of Appeals Upholding Fines.

Within the next few weeks more than fifty local milkmen will be prosecuted in the Police Court for violation of the law in selling impure products. More than 150 cases are at present pending, but it is not likely that all of them will be pushed.

Special United States Attorney Cobb, who has charge of the matter at the present time, is busy drawing up information in the cases and preparing for the issuance of warrants. He said yesterday afternoon that he did not feel at liberty to make public the names of the milk dealers until the prosecutions had assumed a more advanced stage.

Most of the milkmen will be defended by Henry E. Davis and Attorney O'Brien, legal representatives of the Milk Dealers' Association. Mr. Cobb stated that the time for the hearing of the cases will be determined within a few days after a conference between attorneys for the prosecution and defense.

The wholesale prosecution is the result of a decision of the Court of Appeals as to what constitutes impure milk. The trouble arose a number of months ago when a milk dealer was prosecuted in the Police Court and fined \$50. Attorney Davis, who defended the milkman, appealed the case to the higher court, but the decision of the Police Court was sustained. Mr. Davis filed a writ of error, but it was denied. The point at issue being settled definitely, the general prosecution of violators of the law was decided upon. Most of the cases are old ones, dating back more than two years. The prosecutions are the result of information filed by inspectors in the employ of the District Health Department.

Expect Plea of Guilty.

Mr. Cobb said yesterday that it is expected a good many of the milkmen will plead guilty. These men will be made examples of. More clemency will be shown in the cases brought before the court after the first batch have been disposed of. It is probable that Assistant United States Attorney John Lewis Smith will have charge of the prosecution of the cases at the Police Court.

The law which has been violated and upon which the prosecutions are based reads:

"An article shall be deemed to be adulterated if it consists in whole or in part of a filthy, decomposed, or putrid animal or vegetable substance; or any portion of an animal unfit for food, whether manufactured or not, or if it is the product of a diseased animal, or one that has died otherwise than by slaughter."

The penalty for violation of the law is a fine not in excess of \$200 for the first offense, and for each subsequent offense a fine of not more than \$500, or imprisonment not in excess of a year, or both, in the discretion of the court.

COLLEGE FOR COLLEGIANS.

Former Minister to Persia Plans Formation of New Institution.

A college for the political training of university men is planned by Truxton Beale, former Minister to Persia. Mr. Beale announced yesterday that he planned to obtain a site for the building in a street facing Potomac Park. It is planned by Mr. Beale to put the college in charge of a corporation consisting of presidents of universities.

Annual sessions would be held, at which there would be present representatives of senior college classes, and members of university faculties. Members of Congress would be requested to address the conventions, so that data might be obtained in order that the purpose of the institution could be fulfilled by "giving expression of academic views upon current political matters, and confederating American colleges and universities for the study of politics at first hand, and to serve also as a clearing house for advanced collegiate ideas."

WIDOW HAS 14 CHILDREN.

Former Army Officer's Wife Pleads for a Pension.

Rumor that Griffith Will Play with Board of Trade.

Washington's Ore Output.

The value of the gold, silver, copper, and lead output of Washington State in 1912 is fixed at \$1,128,214 by the Geological Survey in a statement issued here yesterday. This is an increase of \$4,137 over the production in 1911. Stevens County ores brought about the increase. Thirty-four of the principal mines producing are deep mines and twelve placer mines.
