BANKING MATTERS WILL BE TAKEN UP

Currency Committee of the National Chamber of Commerce Meets Here Wednesday.

SESSIONS MAY BE LENGTHY

The currency and banking committee of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America will meet in Washington Wednesday. The length of time the committee remains in session will be determined by the progress made by Congress in considering all financial legislation now before the extra session. The officers of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America, and the members of the currency and banking committee regard the task of this committee as vitally related to business stability. Therefore, instead of having the Southeastern, South Central, Eastern, and Western groups of the committee deliberate in separate cities, and thus consume valuable time by interchanges of opinion through the mails, a joint meeting of all groups in a committee will be held for the first time in the history of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America.

John W. Craddock, of Lynchburg, Va., president of the Craddock-Terry Company, as chairman of the Southeastern group, will be present, with John C. Freeman, of Richmond, Va., president of the Drew-Hughes Company, and Thomas K. Southgate, of Norfolk, Va., of T. S. Southgate & Co.

The Eastern group will be headed by Irving T. Bush, president of the Bush Terminal Company, New York City, as chairman, and he will have as his fellow-committee men Edmund D. Fisher, Deputy Comptroller of New York City; Henry R. Kunhardt, of Kunhardt & Co., New York City; Edward D. Page, formerly of Faulkner & Page, dry goods commission merchant, New York City, and Joseph French Johnson, dean of the New York University School of Commerce, New York City.

The South Central group will be headed by George A. Mahan, of Mahan, Smith & Mahan, Hannibal, Mo. There will be associated with him Wallace D. Simmons, of the Simmons Hardware Company, St. Louis, Mo.; F. B. Hollenberg, Little Rock, Ark.; J. A. Pondron, Texarkana, Ark.; and Charles Godchaux, of New Orleans, La., who bears a proxy for Crawford H. Ellis, of New Orleans, La.

The Western group, it is expected, will be headed by John V. Farwell, of the John V. Farwell Company, Chicago, Ill., as chairman, and associated with him will be J. Lawrence Daughlin, Chicago, Ill.; William A. Scott, Madison, Wis.; and George William Bruce, Milwaukee, Wis.

CIVIC BODIES WILL HAVE A BUSY WEEK

Anacostia Organizations to Prepare Estimates for Improvements to Be Submitted to Commissioners.

Several civic bodies in Anacostia will be busy this week and meetings are scheduled to be held. The most important business to be transacted at all of these meetings will be the preparation of estimates for improvements in that section to be presented to the District Commissioners to be included in their annual budget to Congress. Probably the most important item will be that for the acquisition of Oxon Run Valley beyond Congress Heights for a public park. The Anacostia Association will endeavor to secure at least one item, that of \$2,000 for improving Nichols Avenue from the bridge to Talbert Street. This evening the Hilldale Association is scheduled to meet in Odd Fellows' Hall. Tomorrow evening, while the regular meeting of the Hilldale Association is scheduled, it is probable the executive committee will meet to pass on the wants of the community, and later a general meeting will be called.

Wednesday evening the Public Improvement Association of Congress Heights is scheduled to meet in the town hall on Alabama Avenue, where the legislative committee will present its complete report. The executive committee of the Anacostia Citizens' Association will present its desires to the Commissioners, as no meetings of a regular body are held during the summer.

Electa Chapter, No. 2, Order of the Eastern Star, of Anacostia, tomorrow evening will observe the nineteenth anniversary of the organizing of the chapter, and the committee in charge has made elaborate plans for this affair. It will be the last meeting until the 26th and visitors from the Grand Chapter and other chapters in the District are expected to be present. The committee on arrangements consists of Simon Bubbs, chairman; Milton Phillips, Charles A. Roberts, Samuel H. Copes, Charles A. Stevens, and William Scantlebury, Jr. A musical program will be contributed and refreshments served. The chapter is also arranging an excursion to be held shortly at Colonial Beach.

A meeting of all the parishioners of Emmanuel Episcopal Church has been called for Friday evening by the rector, the Rev. William O. Roppe, for the purpose of acquainting the people with the financial condition of the parish and outlining plans for the future.

Two former residents of Anacostia died yesterday at their homes in Washington. James E. Arnold, son of Mr. and Mrs. James E. Arnold, pioneer residents of Anacostia, died suddenly at his home, in Fifth Street, at the age of 77. He resided in Nichols Avenue, Anacostia, for a number of years. His wife, Mrs. Ella Arnold, and one daughter, Miss Eugenia Arnold, survive him. William E. Gale, who for a number of years was a druggist in Hilldale, died at his home, in Hillbrook, following a brief illness.

The trustees of the Anacostia Masonic Hall have decided to make improvements to the hall in Fourteenth Street to the extent of about \$1,000. A new roof is to be placed over the structure and interior decoration work will be done. The entrance also will be changed to some extent, and it is intended to place additional iron beams at different places in order to strengthen the building.

The congregation of St. Teresa's parish is arranging to conduct a lawn sale at the space formerly occupied by the moving picture park in Nichols Avenue, for a week, beginning July 1.
