VIRGINIA'S AUTO TAX DECLARED JUSTIFIABLE

Edward Voigt, Jr., Says District Has
Discriminated Against Old
Dominion.

MARYLAND RETALIATION URGED

hat sentiment among Washington motorists is divided over the justice of the recent regulation passed by the Board of Supervisors of Alexandria County, Va., imposing a special tax on the automobile owners of the District in addition to the regular State tax, is evidenced by a statement made yesterday by Edward Voigt, Jr. Mr. Voigt declares that his expression is shared by a large number of Washington motorists who feel that Alexandria County was justified in passing the regulation. He declared the District authorities had discriminated against Virginia automobile owners in favor of Maryland when the treatment of District motorists by officers of the latter State was taken into consideration. He was especially bitter toward the Maryland officials, and the "sham" justice accorded District motorists when arrested for technical violations of the Maryland law.

"It has been my experience," said Mr. Voigt, "and the experience of a number of other Washington motorists that the officers of Maryland take every advantage of the least technicality in regard to the speed regulations. They detain a number of cross-road idlers to make as many arrests as they can, and haul the motorists before a supposed justice of the peace, who is apt to fine you from \$5 to \$25, according to the temperature of the day."

"I am willing to vouch that they have collected enough fines off the District motorists to rebuild their city hall. However, the District officials have been so lenient toward the Maryland motorists that we could not build a fence half way round the courthouse with the fines collected for flagrant violations of the law."

"I think our municipality must have been asleep at the switch for permitting the Maryland authorities to run amuck for so long without getting even. Instead of making the tax as small as they have for Maryland, they should make it five times more, and stay on amicable terms with Gov. Mann and the Commonwealth of Virginia and thank them for their liberality of law in the past."

"Virginia motorists have been dealt with in an unbecomingly unfair manner by our lawmakers in regard to equal taxation with Maryland. The fee is just the same for a Virginian to cross our boundaries as it is for a Marylander. Virginia always has treated us fairly, while the same cannot be said for Maryland. I don't blame Virginia for resenting the imposition, and do not blame her for not standing by it."

COL. COSBY OPERATED UPON.

Superintendent of Public Buildings Stricken by Appendicitis.

Col. Spencer Cosby, superintendent of Public Buildings and Grounds, yesterday was operated on by Dr. James F. Mitchell, of 1341 Nineteenth Street Northwest, for appendicitis at the Providence Hospital. The operation was reported a success. It is believed that the patient will be able to leave the hospital within two weeks.

According to an order recently issued by Secretary of War Garrison, Col. Cosby and other army officers who have served four years or more in Washington will be transferred to another post on September 1. Col. Cosby first came to this city in 1865. He has served successively as officer in charge of the Washington Aqueduct, as Engineer Commissioner of the District, and then as superintendent of Public Buildings and Grounds.

SENATE MAY CONFIRM O. P. NEWMAN TODAY

Members of House Rules Committee, However, Say They Will Push Fight Against Him.

The Senate today probably will act upon the confirmation of Oliver P. Newman as District Commissioner. It is believed generally that he will be confirmed, although members of the House Rules Committee still declare they will carry the fight against him to the floor of the Senate.

Mr. Newman called at the White House yesterday and had a brief conference with Secretary Tumulty. He said the business was of no moment. Frederick L. Siddons, recently confirmed Commissioner, confidently expects the Senate to act favorably upon Mr. Newman's appointment early this week. The two are planning to enter upon their duties simultaneously.

President Wilson, upon returning to the city yesterday, was shown the evidence presented by the Anti-Saloon League in opposition to the confirmation of Frank B. Lord as member of the Excise Board. Leaders in the opposition have appealed to the president to withdraw Mr. Lord's name from the Senate. Mr. Lord called at the White House yesterday and had a conference with Secretary Tumulty.

Tractants have also been filed against the confirmation of R. G. Smith as a member of the Excise Board. President Wilson has not yet appointed a successor to John B. Colpoys, whose nomination he recently withdrew. There are many applicants for the position.
