Everyone settles down. Little groups form. There is much chattering and laughing, much of it suppressed, but a little unrestrained, sounding rather unbecomingly in the half-quiet.

ANTIS IN FEAR OF SUFFRAGISTS

May Ask Police Protection at Meeting to Be Held in Plainfield, N. J.

"CAUSE" IS HIT HARD

In Statement from Headquarters of Those Opposed to Movement, Grievances Are Recited.

"Because Mrs. Thomas Preston, formerly Mrs. Grover Cleveland, and her friends gave a tremendous impetus to the fight against woman suffrage in New Jersey, the opponents of votes for women may ask for police protection against the suffragists at the anti-suffrage meeting to be held in Plainfield next Thursday. At this meeting Mrs. Grace Duffield Goodwin and other noted anti-suffragists will deliver addresses."

Sign of Recantment.
The anti-suffragists recognized the sentiment and signatures as a steal from an offensive cartoon in a weekly pro-suffrage publication. The bouquet incident was merely the sequel to the recent activities of the anti-suffragists in Plainfield, their methods having been to scribble in chalk insulting words and sentences on the doorsteps of prominent Plainfield women opposed to equal suffrage.

Bishop Against "Cause."
"A men's advisory committee, consisting of Hon. Henry Leavitt, Justice Hudson Dixon, Charles Minnegrode and Col. William Libbey, has been formed to bring the men of New Jersey into active support of the anti-suffrage doctrine. The Very Rev. James McPaul, Bishop of Trenton, has stated emphatically that he will support no political candidate who stands for equal suffrage and socialist principles."

Wife's Hat Displeases Him.
Grand Junction, Colo., July 27.—That his wife has displeased him by appearing on the street with big patches of talcum powder on the back of her neck and with a rat plainly showing in her hair is the charge made in a petition for divorce from his wife, Ellen Mabel, by George Kildon, which was filed in the County Court, County charges that her husband sneaked up behind her to dab her neck with powder and that he discovered her hair in order to have grounds for divorce were filed by Mrs. Kildon.

"CARNEGIE PEACE IDEA IS WRONG"

Brig. Gen. A. L. Mills Discusses Financier's Praise of German Emperor.

U. S. SHOULD PREPARE

Says Jap War Talk Caused by Weakness of This Country Regarding Available Forces.

In praising the German Emperor as a great peacemaker, Andrew Carnegie is utterly inconsistent with the teachings of his own school of world peace propaganda, in the opinion of Brig. Gen. A. L. Mills, chief of the division of military affairs, War Department.

"Mr. Carnegie hails the Emperor of Germany as the greatest peace force in the world," said Gen. Mills, "yet Mr. Carnegie and his paid employees are trying to discourage the efforts of those who are trying to maintain peace along the very lines which have been so very effective in Germany. Who, for a moment, believes that the German Emperor could have maintained peace if Germany had not been prepared for war?"

"That the German government has maintained peace for a quarter of a century is the most effective answer to the demand of those who are clamoring for disarmament, particularly when the countries of the world are far from that universal accord which makes disarmament possible."

JUSTICE WRIGHT BACK FROM TRIP DOWN BAY

With Family, He Spent Two Weeks in His Speedy Cabin Cruiser Christella. SCHOOLS IN PRISONS ARE ON THE INCREASE
Dr. A. C. Hill, of New York, Compiles Bulletin for Bureau of Education.
That even prison life is yielding to modern humanitarian impulses is indicated in the number of prisons that are maintaining schools for the benefit of prisoners. Out of fifty-five prisons in the United States and Canada reporting to the United States Bureau of Education, forty-four have schools. In thirty-three of these a civilian head teacher is in charge. Altogether there are twenty-seven evening schools, nineteen day schools, and eight correspondence schools. Both academic and trade subjects are taught.

In arguing for schools in prisons, Dr. A. C. Hill, of the New York State Education Department, who has prepared a bulletin on the subject for the United States Bureau of Education, points out that there are three ways of handling a man whom the courts have pronounced unfit to remain in society: "First, he may be put to death at once; second, he may be slowly killed in a destructive environment; third, he may be placed in a favorable environment and restored to normal health, if possible."

Prison schools represent an attempt to apply the last of these methods, according to Dr. Hill. Prison libraries form an important educational factor, and special attention is given to them in the Bureau's bulletin. Dr. Hill notes that there is usually plenty of books, but that the quality of the reading matter is seldom satisfactory. In his conclusion Dr. Hill urges that better methods and greater efficiency in character building are needed all along the line, back to the school and the home. He believes that "public effort should be directed more fully to providing the right kind of education for the thousands of neglected children whose environment is such as to make the development of bad and dangerous characters almost inevitable."
